Guidance Document n°3 on the harmonised free allocation methodology for the EU ETS – 2024 revision

Data collection guidance

Final version issued on 8 March 2024

The guidance does not represent an official position of the Commission and is not legally binding. However, this guidance aims to clarify the requirements established in the EU ETS Directive and the FAR and is essential to understanding those legally binding rules.

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1 Introduction

1.1 Scope of this Guidance Document

This guidance document is part of a group of documents¹, which are intended to support the Member States², and their Competent Authorities, in the consistent implementation throughout the Union of the allocation methodology for the second allocation period in Phase 4 of the EU ETS, following the revision of the EU ETS Directive³ and the Delegated Regulation of the Commission 2019/331 on “Transitional Union-wide rules for harmonised free allocation of emission allowances pursuant to Article 10a of the EU ETS Directive” (FAR)⁴, and the subsequent implementing acts. Guidance Document 1 on General Guidance to the Allocation Methodology provides an overview of the legislative background to the group of guidance documents. It also explains how the different guidance documents relate to each other and provides a glossary of terminology used throughout the guidance.

Guidance Document 3 on Data Collection may provide support when performing the data collection pursuant to Article 14 of the FAR in order to define the complete list of installations as well as to calculate any free allocation to be determined for the National Implementing Measures (NIMs) pursuant to Article 11(1) of the Directive 2003/87/EC.

Note that this document only covers the transitional harmonised free allocation to industry under Article 10a of the EU ETS Directive. Any allocation under Article 10c (“Option for transitional free allocation for the modernisation of the energy sector”) is outside the scope of this document. Furthermore, it does *not* go into detail regarding the procedures that Member States apply when issuing greenhouse gas emissions permits. It is acknowledged that the approach to setting the installation boundaries laid down in greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions permits differ between Member States.

References to articles within this document generally refer to the revised EU ETS Directive and to the revised FAR.

Note on outstanding issues in this version of the Guidance Document

As not all legal acts specifying the allocation methodology have been adopted, certain elements of this guidance document are as yet undefined. This especially includes issues

related to the update of Commission Implementing Regulation (EU)2019/1842 on rules relating to activity level changes and the update of the benchmark values for the second allocation period of Phase 4. In addition, it can also apply to references to the outstanding legislation itself or to accompanying guidance documents that are still to be prepared or finalised.

In this guidance document, we have indicated such instances by **yellow highlighting**. Specifically for benchmark values and dates, 'XX' have been inserted as placeholders for the values and dates still to be determined.

2 Objective

2.1 Background to data collection

All Member States (MS) will have to send their National Implementation Measures (NIMs) to the European Commission (EC) by 30 September 2024. The Competent Authorities (CA) will therefore need to organise a data collection process relating to each incumbent installation. Specific data collection timelines are subject to national legal obligations and will therefore vary from one MS to another, but the content of the NIMs should follow the allocation rules⁵ in a harmonised way.

To help ensure this harmonisation, the European Commission has developed a 'Baseline data template', made available in all EU languages. MS can choose to make use of this template, or to develop their own, so long as all mandatory data is collected in a harmonised way.

During the data collection process, operators will need to provide the following reports, in line with Article 4(2) of the FAR⁶:

- a. A baseline data report verified as satisfactory, including the operational data relating to their installation and sub-installations (using the NIMs baseline data template provided by their CA);
- b. The monitoring methodology plan presenting how specific data was determined (a template for this has been made available by the EC);
- ba. Where relevant, the climate-neutrality plan in accordance with Article 10a(1), fifth sub-paragraph, and Article 10b(4) of Directive 2003/87/EC;
- c. A verification report issued in accordance with measures adopted pursuant to Article 15 of Directive 2003/87/EC on the baseline data report.

Some of the collected data may be commercially sensitive data: Member States should put in place protective measures necessary for ensuring that only persons that have a need to know have access to confidential information. They also need to ensure that all commercially sensitive documents that will be received for the purpose of calculating allocations and updates of benchmarks will be used only for this purpose and will be treated with the utmost care in order to protect the commercial interests of the undertakings concerned.

2.2 Link to NIMs baseline data template and other documents

To facilitate alignment with the NIMs baseline data template, the contents of each Part of chapter 5 of this guidance document reflects the structure of the template from Sheet

A to Sheet K⁷. Each Part presents the data that needs to be reported for that Sheet and where necessary provides guidance on this data and the way it should be determined. Whenever relevant, this document provides guidance on the use of the NIMs baseline data template. In addition, whenever relevant, this document refers to other documents including the FAR, MRVA and other guidance documents.

All such references are shown in *italic*.

Note: Reference to Chapter or Part means this guidance document, reference to Sheet, Section or point means the NIMS BDR Template

2.3 Relevance of different sections for different installations

Chapter 3 of this guidance document is only relevant to Member States.

Not all Parts in chapter 5 of this document (and the corresponding NIMs baseline data template Sheet sections) are relevant for all installations. Table 1 indicates which Sheets and sections of the template are relevant depending on the characteristics of the installation.

Each Member State will decide whether or not installations ineligible for, or not applying for, free allocation should fill in the NIMs baseline data template; if they are to fill it in, only Sections A.I (“Identification of the Installation”) and A.II (“Information on this baseline data report”) will need to be completed.

All installations eligible for free allocation need to complete the template if they wish to apply for a free allocation after 2025. *See Guidance Document 1 on the allocation methodology for more information on which installations are to be included in the NIMs list, and which among these need to send data using this BDR.*

A schematic overview of the template Sheets and sections to be completed is given in Table 1 below; relevant sections are identified by a cross in the columns of the table. **The table is indicative.**

2.4 General guidelines on the use of the template

This is a reminder of the key guidelines listed in Sheet 'b_Guidelines & conditions' of the template.

- Automatic calculation (to be found in the excel menu: Formula/Calculation options) must be turned on.
- It is recommended that you go through the file from start to end. There are a few functions which will guide you through the form which depend on previous input, such as cells changing colour if an input is not needed (see colour codes below). However, sometimes it is relevant to first continue data input in another Sheet before going on (e.g., "H_specialBM" needs input before "F_ProductBM" can be finalised in cases where Annex III of the FAR must be applied).
- It is especially important to fill in Sheet "A_InstallationData", Sections A.II.5 (Baseline period chosen) and A.III (definition of sub-installations). Without correct information there, calculation results may be wrong, or it may not be possible to enter data for sub-installations correctly.
- Whenever a value of zero is to be reported, it should be entered rather than leaving the cell empty. If a cell is left empty, the CA does not know if the value has not been reported, is irrelevant or unknown. Values needed for calculations should always be entered (especially if zero, because some formulas don't give results as long as required cells are empty).
- In several fields you can choose from predefined inputs. For selecting from such a "drop-down list" either click with the mouse on the small arrow appearing at the right border of the cell, or press "Alt-CursorDown" when you have selected the cell. Some fields allow you to input your own text even if such a drop-down list exists. This is the case when drop-down lists contain empty list entries.
- Error messages will sometimes occur when data entries are incomplete. However, the non-appearance of error messages is not a guarantee for correct calculations, as a data completeness test is not always possible. If no result appears in a green field, it can be assumed that some data is still missing.
- Special care must be taken of consistency of data with the units displayed.
- Error messages are often very short due to the little space available. The most important ones are:

incomplete!	Means that data is not sufficient for calculation (e.g., an emission factor is missing in one year)
inconsistent!	The units selected are inconsistent, and calculations based upon related inputs will give wrong results.
negative!	In this calculation no negative values are allowed.
Manual input!	Means that data has to be entered manually in a case where automatic calculation of a parameter is not possible.
Input in A.III.3 ! E.II.1.n !	These are references to document sections. This means that data in the referenced sections are missing.

○ Colour codes and fonts:

Black bold text: This is text describing the input required.

Smaller italic text: This text gives further explanations.

	Yellow fields indicate mandatory inputs. However, if the topic is not relevant for the installation, no input is required.
	Light yellow fields indicate that an input is optional.
	Green fields show automatically calculated results. Red text indicates error messages (missing data etc.).
	Shaded fields indicate that an input in another field makes the input here irrelevant.
	Grey shaded areas should be filled by Member States before publishing a customised version of the template.
	Light grey areas are dedicated for navigation and hyperlinks.

- Navigation panels on top of each Sheet provide hyperlinks for quick jumps to individual input sections. The first line ("Table of contents", "Previous Sheet", "next Sheet", "Summary") and the points "Top of Sheet" and "End of Sheet" are the same for all Sheets. Depending on the Sheet, further menu items are added. If the background colour of one of the hyperlink areas turns red, this indicates that data is missing in the related section (not in all Sheets).
- This template has been locked against data entry except for yellow fields. However, for transparency reasons, no password has been set. This allows for complete viewing of all formulae. When using this file for data entry, it is recommended to keep the protection in force. The Sheets should only be unprotected for checking the validity of formulae. It is recommended to do this in a separate file.
- **In order to protect formulae against unintended modifications, which usually lead to wrong and misleading results, it is of utmost importance NOT TO USE the CUT & PASTE. If you want to move data, first COPY and PASTE them, and thereafter delete the unwanted data in the old (wrong) place.**
- Special care must be taken to ensure consistency of data between the different sheets of the template (e.g., CHP tool in Sheet D with heat and electricity balances in Sheet E, heat produced in CHP tool in Sheet D with heat produced in heat balance in Sheet E).
- Data fields have not been optimised for numerical and other formats. However, Sheet protection has been limited so as to allow you to use your own formats. In particular, you may decide about the number of decimal places displayed. The number of places is in principle independent from the precision of calculation. In principle the option "Precision as displayed" of MS Excel should be deactivated. For more details, consult MS Excel's "Help" function on this topic.

3 MS-specific parameters in NIMs baseline data template

Sheet I_MSspecific is only relevant for Member States that use the NIMs baseline data template provided by the EC.

MSconst_RequirePermitInfo: If set to TRUE, the complete Section A.I.1.g (Information on the Greenhouse gas emissions permit) becomes optional as indicated by the relevant colour change.

MSconst_RequireArt27Info: If set to TRUE, entries in Section A.I.4.d will become optional as indicated by the relevant colour change.

MSconst_RequireArt27aInfo: If set to TRUE, entries in Section A.I.4.e will become optional as indicated by the relevant colour change.

“MSconst_AllowInstEmissionTotals”: Member States can decide to allow operators to only declare total emissions at installation level. In order to do this, the parameter “MSconst_AllowInstEmissionTotals” should be set to TRUE (this parameter is by default set to False). If this parameter is set to True, all the source stream related inputs are shown as optional, while the fields in D.I.2 change from “forbidden” to mandatory. In other words, operators no longer need to provide data for each source stream, but can enter totals only. If this parameter is set to False (default) completion of all five Sheets B+C is mandatory for each source stream and emission source.

4 Process of data collection for operators

This chapter provides guidelines for operators on steps to take before submitting a complete NIMs baseline data template, the corresponding monitoring methodology plan and the verification report.

Good practice	Description
<i>Before receiving the NIMs baseline data template</i>	
Become familiar with the allocation rules	The data collection cannot be completed unless the operator knows how the allocation rules apply to its installation. The operator should therefore become familiar with the allocation rules.
Organise independent verification	Operators should contract an independent and accredited verifier, in line with the Accreditation and Verification Regulation, so that the completed NIMs baseline data template and the corresponding monitoring methodology plan can be verified. Especially for complex installations, it is advisable to foresee a two-step approach for verification, including a preliminary step aimed only at checking the correctness of the split into sub-installations of the installation.
<i>After receiving the NIMs baseline data template, before submission</i>	
Become familiar with the NIMs baseline data template and identify relevant sections	Have initial estimations about number of sub-installations, and identify which product benchmark(s) are applicable.
Make internal planning	Organise internally so that submission of the NIMs baseline data template to CA will be in time, allow sufficient time for verification.
Organise internal meeting(s) with relevant operators / technical experts	Operators may organise internal meetings with relevant operators and / or technical experts to discuss the availability and quality of data. Collect data from the best available sources.
Organise meeting(s) with technically connected installations (if relevant)	If an installation has relevant technical connections, it is recommended to align data of ingoing and outgoing streams (heat, waste gases, CO ₂) with the technically connected installation(s).
Ask for clarification if needed	If certain points are unclear, operators should ask their national CA for clarification.

A “Installation Data” – General information on this report

This Part of the guidance document describes what data needs to be provided to identify the installation being assessed and its most important characteristics for the purpose of determining free allocation.

Sections A.I and A.II are mandatory for all operators falling within the scope of the EU ETS Directive, if the MS cannot obtain these data from other sources (see section 2.3 of this guidance). Section A.III is mandatory for all operators of installations eligible for free allocation. Section A.IV is mandatory for operators of installations eligible for free allocation and meeting the listed conditions.

A. Sheet "InstallationData" - GENERAL INFORMATION ON THIS REPORT

Identification of the Installation

1 General information:

- (a) **Name of the installation:**
This name should be the same as has been already used for correspondence with the competent authority.
- (b) **Member State in which the installation is situated:**
"Member State" means here: State which participates in the EU ETS, i.e. EU Member States and Iceland, Norway and Liechtenstein.
- (c) **Has this installation been included in the EU ETS before?**
- (d) **Unique identifier provided by the competent authority:**
*This is the ID used by the competent authority for correspondence with the installation, e.g. for free allocation in earlier periods.
For installations which have not been included in the EU ETS before, operators are requested to contact the competent authority to receive such ID.
Competent authorities must ensure to have a unique ID available before notifying any data to the European Commission.*
- (e) **Identification code of the installation in the Registry:**
*This is usually a natural number, i.e. a code different from the Permit identifier used in the Registry (EUTL).
Together with the Member State selected under (b), this Registry ID (unique ID) will result in the Unique ID displayed automatically in (f) below. E.g. if the installation with Registry ID 123456 is situated in Belgium, this will result in "BE000000000123456". If your installation received free allocation in the previous phase of the EU ETS, please ensure that the Unique ID is identical to the one in the previous phase.*
- (f) **Unique ID for notification to the Commission:**
- (g) **Information on the greenhouse gas emissions permit:**
*Please provide here information on the greenhouse gas emissions permit (*permit issued in accordance with Articles 5 and 6 of the EU ETS Directive).
Member States may make this information optional if the competent authority is in possession of this information already.*

- (h) **Date of start of operation of the installation:**
This input is only relevant if the installation, as a whole, has started operation after 1 January 2019.
- (i) **This installation is an incumbent:**
An installation is an incumbent if it has received a greenhouse gas emission permit for the first time on or before 30 June 2024 for the period 2026-2030.

A.I.1 General information

The operator should specify:

- a) **Name of the installation:** this is the name generally used on permits and other official documentation and should be consistent with previous communication with the competent authorities (if applicable);
- b) **Member State** in which the installation is situated. “Member State” means here: State which participates in the EU ETS, i.e., EU-27 and Iceland, Norway and Liechtenstein.
- c) If the installation has been **included in the EU ETS** before 30 June 2024.

- d) **Unique identifier** code: this is usually the ID code used in earlier NIMs or any other ID issued by the competent authorities in accordance with Articles 5 and 6 of the EU ETS Directive. For installations which have not been previously included in the EU ETS, operators are requested to contact the competent authority to receive such ID. Competent authorities must ensure all installations have a unique ID available before notifying any data to the European Commission.
- e) **Identification code of the installation in the Registry.** This is usually a natural number, i.e., a code different from the Permit identifier used in the Registry, usually known as the installation ID. Together with the Member State selected under (b), this Registry ID (unique ID) will result in the Unique ID displayed automatically in (f) below. If your installation received free allocation in the previous phase of the EU ETS, please ensure that the Unique ID is identical to the one in the previous phase.
- f) **Unique ID** for notification to the Commission, this is automatically derived and is the ID to be used in correspondence with the Commission;
- g) **Permit information:** here the operator should fill in the name of the competent authority responsible for handling the permit of that installation, the permit ID and the date of issuance when the installation was first included in the EU ETS, the most recent updated permit ID and date of issuance if applicable (i.e., re-issue dates and IDs), as well as the latest version of the Monitoring Methodology Plan used for the application. Member States may make this information optional if the competent authority is already in possession of this information.
- h) **Date of start of operation** of the installation. This input is only relevant if the installation started operation after 1 January 2019. If this date is left blank, it will be assumed that the date of start of operation was before 1 January 2019.
- i) If the installation is an **incumbent** or a new entrant. In the second allocation period of Phase 4, a new entrant is an installation that has received a greenhouse gas emission permit for the first time after the 30 June 2024. *See Guidance Document 7 on new entrants and closures for more information on definitions of incumbents and new entrants. See also Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches.*
- j) **Operator data:** name, address and phone numbers. The operator is the person who operates or controls an installation or to whom decisive economic power over the technical functioning of the installation has been delegated.
- k) **Installation address**

A.I.2 Contact persons

The operator should specify the contact details of the person(s) responsible for completing or overseeing the report in case clarifications or communication is needed, In particular: name, address, email and telephone number should be reported.

A.I.3 Verifier engaged for this baseline data report

The operator should specify:

- a) The details of the **verification company**, in particular: company name, address and country

- b) The **person** who carried out (or project managed) the verification, in particular: name, e-mail address and telephone number
- c) Information about the verifier's accreditation, in particular the Member States in which it is allowed to operate and the registration number issued by the Accreditation Body. The availability of such registration information may depend on the administering Member State's practice of accreditation / certification of verifiers. Where the Member State does not use accreditation but uses certification to recognise verifiers, the relevant information should be entered below as if it were accreditation.

A.I.4 Further installation data

The objective of this section is to further understand the activities carried out at the installation being assessed and to identify installations that may be opted-out of the EU ETS.

4 Further installation data:

(a) Activities according to Annex I of the EU ETS Directive:

*This information is important for the competent authorities because changes compared to previous ETS phases may have taken place.

This section describes what data should be reported to identify the sub-installations present at the installation. This section is mandatory for all installations that are eligible for free allocation. *For more information on the eligibility criteria please refer to section 4 of Guidance Document 1 on general guidance.*

It is essential that all sub-installations in this section are entered correctly, as this will impact all further input relating to sub-installations. The start of normal operation needs to be reported only if it occurred after 1 January 2019. This will impact for each sub-installation the years to be taken into account for the determination of the HAL. If the start was on or before 1 January 2019, entries are not mandatory. Sub-installations included in this section also need to be consistent with those listed in the Monitoring Methodology Plan.

More details on how to derive the sub-installations is given in Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches.

A.III.1 Product benchmark sub-installations

A.III.2 Sub-installations with fall-back approaches

The information on this section will be particularly important for the treatment of cross boundary heat flows and waste gases. *For more information on these two issues see Guidance Document 6 on cross boundary heat flows and Guidance Document 8 on waste gases and process emissions sub-installations.*

The operator should specify:

- a) Information relevant for **identifying technical connections** to the installation, in particular:
- Name of the ETS installation or non-ETS entity linked to the installation assessed. *Where heat is consumed that was produced as a result of nitric acid production within the same installation, then the name of the installation itself should be provided in the NIMs baseline data template.*
 - Type of entity: “Installation covered by ETS”, “Installation for municipal waste incineration”, “Installation outside ETS”, “Installation producing Nitric Acid”, or “Heat distribution network”. In the case of a heat distribution network, this information should be provided, regardless of whether the entity is part of the ETS or not. *The NIMs baseline data template facilitates the selection by providing a drop-down menu.*
 - Type of connection, i.e., is the connection due to an exchange of measurable heat, waste gas, transferred CO₂, or intermediate products covered by product benchmarks¹⁴?
 - Flow direction, i.e. is it net import or net export, considering it from the perspective of the installation to which this report refers (‘Import’ to this installation, or ‘Export’ from this installation)?
- b) **Further information** regarding those connected installations, if relevant:
- The European Union Transaction Log (EUTL) installation ID. This installation Registry ID is mandatory if the connected installation is covered by the EU ETS, and if it has already been covered by the EU ETS before 30 June 2024.
 - The name and contact details of the operator of that installation so that any communication is facilitated. For entities not covered by the EU ETS, the contact details are mandatory, but the Registry ID is not required.

This Part of the guidance document aims to provide guidance on the collection of data relating to emissions source streams, originating from combustion and/or process emissions. A separate Sheet is prepared for each year of the baseline period. Therefore, for the first baseline period, Sheet “B+C Emissions Y1” refers to year 2019, Sheet “B+C Emissions Y2” refers to year 2020, and so on until “B+C Emissions Y5” which refers to year 2023.

Section B+C.I indicates whether providing data in this section is mandatory or not (see section on MS-specific parameters).

B+C.I General Guidance for source stream data

The elements in this section are valid for all sections in Sheets “B+C Emissions Yx”.

Member States may allow operators to only report totals for the whole installation in Section D.I. If this is the case, the “Member State requires detailed source stream data generally to be reported mandatorily” is shown as “False” in this section, and entering data in these Sheets is optional (it is then possible to only report annual total emissions in section D.I).

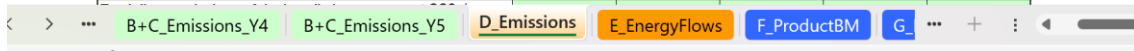

D.I Total Direct Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Energy Input from Fuels

This section describes how to report total direct GHG emissions and energy input from fuels. Total GHG emissions and energy input from fuels are needed in the determination of free allocation.

D.I.1 Automatically calculated data at installation level

If data has been entered in Sheets B+C (this is only mandatory if section I of the Sheets B+C indicates True), point 1 of this section will automatically display data summarising these values. In that case, providing emission totals in point 2 of this section is not mandatory. However, it is recommended to provide data in point 2 in all cases to allow checks on omissions and double counting.

D.I.2 Input if Member State allows aggregated reporting at installation level

If providing detailed source stream data is not mandatory in the relevant Member State (i.e., False is indicated in section I of the B+C Sheets), the operator is **required to enter emission totals** in the table at point 2 of this section. However, as indicated in D.I.1 above, it is recommended to always provide data in this table.

The operators should specify the following data in the table of point 2 for each year of the baseline period:

- Total CO₂ emissions from fossil and non-sustainable biogenic origin in tonnes of CO₂ per year¹⁵;
- Biomass emissions, either from sustainable biomass, or from biomass for which sustainability criteria do not apply, in tonnes of CO₂ per year¹⁶;
- Total N₂O emissions in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year;
- Total PFC emissions in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year;
- The sum of direct GHG emissions in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year (i.e., the sum of the fossil emissions specified above) is calculated automatically by the template;
- The amount of transferred CO₂ exported from the installation in tonnes of CO₂ per year. Figures should be entered as negative values;
- The installation's total direct emissions in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year, taking into account the transferred CO₂, are automatically calculated by the template;
- Total energy input from fuels in TJ per year, including from biomass and waste gases. This value should reflect the total net energy input if any of the source streams of the installation is evaluated on the basis of a mass balance.

D.I.3 Result of installation level data for use in Sheets "D_Emission" and "E_EnergyFlows"

In this section, the NIMs baseline data template automatically selects the data to be used elsewhere in the template. If data is displayed in both point 1 and point 2, and if there are differences between the two, data provided in point 2 will be used as no completeness checks can be performed on data provided in Sheets B+C. Any conflicting values will be highlighted with red figures in the table of point 3. It is the responsibility of the operator to review and correct any conflicting data.

D.II Attribution of emissions to sub-installations

For the purpose of allocation, operators are required to attribute the total emissions to one or more sub-installation(s). In this section, data is automatically calculated based on data provided in Sheets F and G.

The operator should provide the following data, where relevant:

- Total amount of fuel input into CHP units:** the annual fuel input into the CHP unit should be provided in TJ per year;

(g) **Reference efficiencies:** the values included here are the reference efficiency for heat production in a stand-alone boiler, and the reference efficiency of electricity production without cogeneration, based on the use of natural gas. The operator should update these values with the appropriate fuel-specific values from Annexes I and II of Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2015/2402, without application of the correction factors for climatic conditions in Annex III and avoided grid losses in Annex IV of this Regulation (the Regulation can be downloaded via:

IV Waste gas tool

Does the installation consume waste gases produced outside the boundaries of a product benchmark?

Pursuant to the definition given in Articles 2(10) and 2(11) of the FAR, (combustible) waste gases occurring outside the boundaries of product benchmarks are considered process emissions. However, for waste gases a CO2 amount equivalent to natural gas used for the "technically usable energy content" is to be subtracted from the total process emissions. The amount of process emissions without this subtraction is referred to as "uncorrected process emissions" below. In order to determine the "technically usable energy content" the following information is needed:

- Amount of waste gases used for electricity production and for production of measurable or other heat outside of product benchmark sub-installations, or exported out of the installation;
- Optionally (for consistency checking) the process emissions associated with these waste gas amounts should be reported.
- Net calorific value of the waste gas;
- Assumptions for the different efficiency for the use of waste gas and natural gas. These assumptions are as follows: Efficiency of electricity production with natural gas is 52.0%, with waste gases 35%;
- Emission factor of natural gas: 56.11 CO2/TJ.

Because both possible sub-installations can be concerned in one installation, or because different waste gases can occur, this "waste gas tool" exists twofold in this template.

1 Tool for calculating the amount of process emissions if waste gases are produced outside product benchmarks

(e) **Estimation of waste gas emissions**
Optionally, and for the purpose of consistency checks only, please provide an estimation of the quantity of emissions relating to the waste gas used or exported. This amount must be consistent with the amount of waste gas under point (f) below.

(f) **Amount of waste gas produced outside product benchmark sub-installations, including for exports:**
This amount must be consistent with the carbon leakage status selected under point (a) above.

According to the definition in Article 2(10), combusted waste gases are considered to be process emissions if they are produced outside the boundaries of a product benchmark and only to the extent that they exceed the emissions from the combustion of an amount of natural waste gas with an equivalent amount of technically useable energy content. *For more information on allocation in case of the production and consumption of waste gases please refer to Guidance Document 8 on waste gases and process emission sub-installations.*

The operator should specify the following data separately in the case of a process emissions sub-installation deemed to be:

- exposed to a risk of carbon leakage; and/or
- not exposed to a risk of carbon leakage.

Because both possible sub-installations can occur in one installation, or because different waste gases can occur, the "waste gas tool" exists twice in the NIMs baseline data template. The data for the two sub-installations together should add up to the totals for the installation.

D.IV.1 Tool for calculating the amount of process emissions if waste gases are produced outside product benchmarks

The operator should specify:

- The type of process emissions sub-installation concerned** (exposed to carbon leakage or non-exposed).

- b) **Whether the installation consumes waste gases** (i.e., select “relevant”) or not (i.e., select “not relevant”).
- c) **Type of waste gas.** The operator should choose a name for the gas stream in the first box and describe the waste gas and the process that produces it in the second box. For example, the description can include the production process from where the waste gas originated, the composition of the gas (e.g. contents of CO, CO₂, NO_x, SO₂, etc.), or a description of the process where it is efficiently combusted. Where there are several waste gases streams, the operator should provide data for each of the different streams in separate files (in this case, the operator should provide separate files in which only this section is filled in for different streams).
- d) **Total amount of “uncorrected” process emissions** in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year. In line with Article 2(10) of the FAR, when calculating allocation for waste gases, an amount of CO₂ equivalent to natural gas used for the “technically usable energy content” needs to be subtracted from the total process emissions. The amount of process emissions before this subtraction is referred to as “uncorrected process emissions” in this tool and reflects all types of process emissions (referred to as types a, b and c in Guidance Document 8).
- e) **Estimation of emissions from the combustion of the waste gases** used or exported, in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year, when combusted for purposes other than flaring (unless it is for safety flaring), taking into account the relevant carbon leakage status. This field is optional and is meant for cross checking. The values must be consistent with the amount of waste gases provided in (f) below.
- f) **Amount of waste gas** (in thousand Nm³ per year or in tonnes per year) **produced outside of the product benchmark** sub-installations and combusted for purposes other than flaring (only in the case of safety flaring can the amount of waste gases flared for safety reasons be taken into account). The relevant carbon leakage status (as selected under point (b)) must be taken into account. *The data can be entered either in tonnes per year, or in 1000 Nm³ per year; the NIMs baseline data template facilitates the selection of unit by providing a drop-down menu. The choice of unit must be consistent with the unit used for the NCV below (point (g)).* It does not matter whether or not the waste gases were produced in the same ETS installation as the one consuming the waste gases.
- g) **Net calorific value (NCV) of the consumed waste gas.** The net caloric value is the amount of heat released during the combustion of the fuel, minus the energy required to vaporise water produced during combustion. NCVs should be determined in compliance with Annex VI of the FAR. The NCV should be expressed in GJ per 1000Nm³ or GJ per tonne depending on the unit chosen under point (f). *The template automatically selects the proper unit based on the selection under (f).*
- h) **Necessary assumptions:** these include the reference efficiencies for the production of electricity using natural gas and using waste gas in %, as well as the emissions factor for natural gas. *See Guidance Document 8 on waste gases and process emission sub-installations for guidance on the reference efficiencies.*

- i) **Emissions to be subtracted to take into account the technically usable energy content.** These amounts in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year are automatically calculated based on the data provided. They correspond to the “consumer part” of the emissions, to be distinguished from the “producer part” of the emissions; *see Guidance Document 8 on waste gases and process emission sub-installations for additional guidance.*
- j) **Process emissions calculated taking into account the correction for waste gases.** This is the final result provided by the tool, in tonnes of CO₂ per year. This amount is defined as the difference between the emissions specified under (d) and (i). The NIMs baseline data template automatically performs the calculation. The resulting data should be entered in Sheet G of the tool for the relevant process emissions sub-installation. If the result is negative, it should be set to zero.

D.IV.2 Tool for calculating the amount of process emissions if waste gases are produced outside product benchmarks

This tool is to be filled in if the installation includes two process emissions sub-installations, both including waste gases, or if several types of waste gases are consumed within the installation. In this case this tool is for the second process emissions sub-installation or for the second type of waste gas and should be filled in according to instructions provided in point D.IV.1.

E “Energy Flows” – Data on energy input, measurable heat and electricity

This Part of the guidance document describes how to report data relating to the attribution of energy input to the different sub-installations.

E.I Energy input from fuels

The free allocation to fuel benchmark sub-installations is directly based on the energy input attributed in this Sheet.

In most cases, the data requested are annual values. Data can be derived from a range of data sources. See *Guidance Document 5 on Monitoring & Reporting for the FAR for more guidance on this topic.*

E. Sheet "EnergyFlows" - DATA ON ENERGY INPUT, MEASURABLE HEAT AND ELECTRICITY

Total energy input

1 Overview and split into use categories

(a) Energy input, total installation:

Please enter in the table below the amount of energy input for heat production, ensuring there is no double-counting between items:

- i. The total energy input from fuels is taken automatically from results displayed in section D.I.
- ii. Total electricity input for the PRIMARY purpose of heat production (e.g. electricity consumed by heat pumps, electric boilers, electric furnaces, ...) unless the fuels from which the electricity is produced are already included under i. above. Note that any other electricity consumption for other purposes than heat production (pumps, drivers, etc.) are NOT included here.
- iii. The total other energy, including from exothermic heat (i.e. from any exothermic chemical reaction such as partial oxidations or carbothermic reductions) or other heat e.g. ambient heat for heat pumps, unless any of this heat is produced from fuels already included under i. above. For example, if steam is recovered from a chemical reaction, the difference between the energy input and output of the process the steam is recovered from should be entered here as exothermic heat.
- iv. Result: total energy input, i.e. the sum of the above. This value represents 100% of the energy that is available for the attribution to the fuel benchmark sub-installations, the production of measurable heat, etc. under the next points below.

(b) Input method:

You can choose the method for entering the values in the table below under point (c). Available options are: "Absolute values" (enter TJ/year), or "percentages". For fast data entries in simple cases, where most entries will be "100%" or zero, percentages are the better choice.

(c) Distribution of energy input to different uses

Please enter in the table below the amount of energy consumed for each use type, or - depending on input (b) - the percentage of amount (a).

- Energy input to product BM is the sum of direct energy input and energy input to measurable heat consumed by the sub-installation
- Energy input for production of measurable heat not used for product BM or electricity production
- Energy input to fuel BM sub-installations, for the primary purpose of the production of heat
- Energy input for electricity production

For attributing fuel input from cogeneration (CHP) to production of measurable heat and electricity, the "CHP tool" in section D.III. has to be used.

Special care should be taken for attribution of energy input to the two sub-installations which are relevant for allocation purposes:

Fuel benchmark sub-installation "CL" (exposed to a significant risk of Carbon Leakage) and "non-CL" (not exposed to carbon leakage risk).

For control purposes, the rest (100% minus total of inputs) is displayed in the bottom line. This refers to energy input which is not eligible for allocation.

NOTE! Please note that due to the changed definition of the fuel benchmark sub-installation for the allocation period 2026-2030, values to be entered here may differ from those provided in the annual activity level reports during the baseline period.

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The operator should ensure that the following data are provided:

a) Energy input from fuels, total installation:

i. Energy input from fuels: These data are taken automatically from Section D.I.3 ("Result of installation data for use in Sheets "D_Emissions" and "E_EnergyFlows"", last line of the table 3).

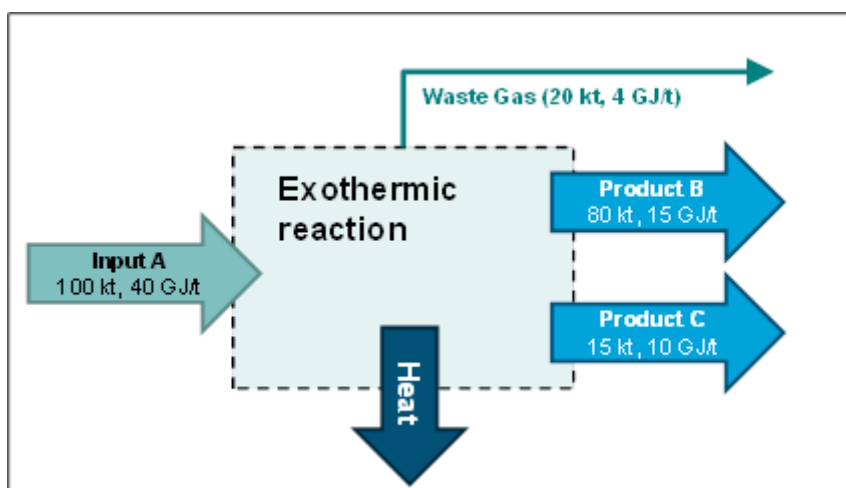
ii. Electricity input for heat production: Here electricity input for the primary purpose of heat production should be indicated unless it has already been

included in the first line of this table; it is likely to have been already included in cases where the electricity is produced from fuels onsite. Any other electricity consumption for purposes other than heat production should not be included in this line.

iii. Other energy input (e.g. exothermic heat): Here the amount of other types of energy, such as exothermic heat from any exothermic reaction should be entered, unless it has already been included in the first line of this table. For example, in an exothermic chemical reaction (e.g. partial oxidation), the exothermic heat available for heat recovery corresponds to the difference in energy content between the inputs and the outputs of the reaction. In the example shown in the following figure, the available exothermic heat would correspond to [Input A – (Output Product B + Output Product C + Export Waste Gas)], i.e.:

$$\frac{[100\,000 \times 40 - (80\,000 \times 15 + 15\,000 \times 10 + 20\,000 \times 4)]}{1\,000} = 2\,570 \text{ TJ}$$

This is the value to be entered under Section E.I.1.(a) iii. ("Other energy input (e.g., exothermic heat)").



iv. Total energy input (sum of the above): the amounts in this line are calculated automatically, summing up the other lines of the table.

- b) **Input method:** the method for entering values in point (c) should be chosen in the drop-down menu between "Absolute values" in TJ per year, and "percentages". For simple cases, it is recommended to use percentages for simplicity reasons and to avoid errors, especially when most entries will be 100% or 0.
- c) Indicate the **energy input attributed to different uses**. It should be noted here that due to the changed definition of the fuel benchmark sub-installation for the second allocation period of Phase 4, the values to be entered in this section may differ from those provided in the annual activity level reports during the baseline period. The values to be provided include:

i. Energy input used within the boundaries of product benchmarks. See *Guidance Document 9 on sector-specific guidance for guidance on system boundaries of product benchmarks*. The energy input includes:

- Direct energy input to production processes at the installation covered by product benchmarks. This excludes energy input for the production of measurable heat that is consumed by production processes covered by product benchmarks.
- Energy input for the onsite production of measurable heat consumed by production processes in the installation covered by the product benchmark. Note that since only the energy input to the installation is considered here, energy input related to the production of imported heat should not be included.

Because heat import and export is not considered, the energy input under this bullet may not completely conform to energy input related to product benchmark sub-installation.

ii. Energy input for the production of measurable heat outside the boundaries of product benchmarks, excluding energy input related to electricity production. Note that since only the energy input to the installation is considered here, energy input related to the production of imported heat should not be included. Because heat import and export is not considered, the energy input at this line may not completely conform to energy input related to heat benchmark sub-installations. It should be noted that heat may be produced both for consumption within product benchmark sub-installations and outside product benchmark sub-installations (e.g., heat export, consumption of production processes not covered by product benchmarks, electricity production). If the heat is used within the boundaries of a product benchmark, then the share of energy used to produce this amount of heat should be included in the share of energy input to product benchmark sub-installations;

iii. Energy input within the boundaries of a fuel benchmark sub-installation deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, producing a non-CBAM good (i.e., “Fuel benchmark sub-installation (CL | non-CBAM)”). See *Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches for guidance on energy consumed within the boundaries of a fuel benchmark sub-installation*. This excludes energy input for the production of measurable heat and electricity. The fuel benchmark sub-installation covers the use of waste gases as fuel for the production of non-measurable heat. For waste gases that were produced outside the boundaries of a product benchmark sub-installation, this sub-installation also covers safety flaring (i.e., no other flaring). If part of the carbon in the fuel leaves the product benchmark sub-installation as part of a waste gas, then the energy content of the share of the waste gas that originates from the fuel should be subtracted from the energy input. See *Guidance Document 8 on waste gases and process emission sub-installations for additional guidance on this topic*. It should be noted that a production process may be involved in the production of both products covered by a product benchmark

and of products not covered by a product benchmark. In that case, shares of the total energy input related to that process should be attributed to product benchmark sub-installations on the one side and to heat production and fuel benchmark sub-installations on the other side.

iv. Energy input within the boundaries of a fuel benchmark sub-installation not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, producing a non-CBAM good (i.e., “Fuel benchmark sub-installation (non-CL | non-CBAM)”). The guidance for this sub-installation is identical to the guidance for the previous point.

v. Energy input within the boundaries of a fuel benchmark sub-installation deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, producing a CBAM good (i.e., “Fuel benchmark sub-installation (CL | CBAM)”). The guidance for this sub-installation is identical to the guidance for point iii.

vi. Energy input for the production of electricity. These data must be consistent with the data in the CHP tool in Sheet D, when relevant. Furthermore, fuel used in back up electricity generators is also to be reported here.

vii. Energy input used for other purposes. The NIMs baseline data template automatically calculates this amount as ‘Rest’. Where an operator chooses not to apply for allowances for a sub-installation for which the administrative burden is deemed to outweigh the benefit, care should be taken that the corresponding amount of energy is included in this ‘Rest’ line. This ensures that there are no omissions or double counting of energy input.

The units used are those chosen in point (b); a second table is provided with the values displayed in the other unit (in % if TJ/year were chosen, in TJ/year if % were chosen), allowing for a control of the results by the operator. If fuel is used in a CHP, the results from the CHP tool in Section D.III.1(i) should be entered here for measurable heat and electricity production. Extra care should be taken in the calculation of the values provided for the three fuel benchmarks sub-installations, as these will be used for allocation purposes. The sum of all the provided values should be equal to the total annual energy input at installation level indicated in point (a). This is checked in the last line of the table. Any ‘Rest’ of energy that is indicated there refers to energy input which is not eligible for allocation.

The attribution of energy input to different uses should be made on a fair basis (such as shares of operating time or production volumes combined with specific energy input related to different products). The operator should report in detail on the way that the attribution of energy use was made. In case of uncertainty, the attribution should be biased such that more energy input is attributed to the product benchmark sub-installation. In general, the attribution of energy input as described in this section should be consistent with the attribution of emissions to different uses as indicated in Section D.II.2 (but only if that section is relevant for the installation under consideration).

E.II Measurable heat

This Part of the guidance describes how to report data related to heat production, consumption, import and export. The operator should first indicate whether this section is relevant, by answering the question “Are any measurable heat flows produced or consumed in, imported to or exported from this installation?”

If the answer to this question is “TRUE”, then the data required by this section should be provided¹⁷; if the answer to this question is “FALSE”, then the operator can move on to the next section. Note that this section will always be relevant if any of the heat benchmark or district heating sub-installations are selected to be relevant in Section A.III.2. In such case, the indicator will be greyed out.

See Guidance Document 5 on Monitoring & Reporting for the FAR for guidance on how to determine amounts of net measurable heat.

All heat data refers to “net amount of measurable heat”, which is the heat content of the heat flow to the user from which the content of the return flow is subtracted.

To calculate the amount of heat that is eligible for free allocation under a heat benchmark sub-installation, the operator should first obtain a complete balance of the measurable heat at the installation.

The following distinctions should be made:

- For heat input:
 - “eligible” heat: net measurable heat is considered eligible if it is produced by the installation or imported from another ETS installation.
 - “non-eligible” heat: heat is considered non-eligible if it is imported from a non-ETS installation or produced from a nitric acid sub-installation.
- For heat use:
 - “eligible” heat: net measurable heat is considered eligible if it is used within the installation or exported to a non-ETS entity.
 - “non-eligible” heat: heat is considered non-eligible if it is consumed for electricity production or exported to an ETS installation.

The aim of this part of the template is to clearly identify the amounts of eligible and non-eligible heat, and to earmark each of them. For this the following hierarchy of approaches is to be used:

1. If the distinction between eligible and non-eligible heat is clear on site, because e.g., of separated heat grid connections or different steam pressures, the eligible and non-eligible heat amounts should be reported based on the real situation and measured values.
2. If this first approach is not feasible, all uses should be weighted based on the ratio of inputs (ETS input over total input).

¹⁷ Unless all heat produced is consumed exclusively within the system boundaries of a unique sub-installation with no import or export of heat. In this case only the detailed heat data do not need to be provided.

It should be noted here that due to the changed definition of the heat benchmark sub-installation for the second allocation period of Phase 4, the values to be entered in this section may differ from those provided in the annual activity level reports during the baseline period.

In this part of the template, the operator should first ensure that the following data are specified, listing all **heat inputs (all heat data should refer to “net amounts of measurable heat”)**:

- a) **Total net amount of measurable heat produced within the boundaries of the installation** in TJ per year. This includes the measurable heat production from all sources, e.g., CHP units, boilers, recovered heat. These data must be consistent with the CHP tool data in Section D.III, where relevant. *See Guidance Document 6 on cross-boundary heat flows for additional guidance on the definition of measurable heat.*
- b) **Measurable heat produced from electricity** in TJ per year. This includes heat from any electric pumps, electric boilers, etc. This amount of heat is to be included in the total net measurable heat (a) above and is requested here for transparency reasons.
- c) **Measurable heat imported from installations covered by the EU ETS** (eligible for free allocation under the heat benchmark sub-installation), specified per ETS installation in TJ per year. The name of installations is to be selected from the drop-down list, which is based on the list of technical connections described in Section A.IV (“List of technical connections”). If the name of the connecting installation cannot be found, it should be added to Section A.IV.
- d) **Measurable heat imported from installations and entities not covered by the EU ETS** (not eligible for free allocation under the heat benchmark sub-installation), specified per non-ETS entity in TJ per year. This should include heat produced from nitric acid sub-installations (in this case “Within installation” should be selected as name of installation, if the nitric acid production is part of this installation). It should also include heat imported from municipal waste installations, as although these are now under the EU ETS scope, they are currently only included for MRVA aspects, and heat generated by these installations is not eligible for free allocation. The data entered into this table will be checked for double counting with deductions under product benchmark sub-installations (see Sheet F_ProductBM). The name of installation(s) is to be selected from the drop-down list, which is based on the list of technical connections described in Section A.IV (“List of technical connections”). If the name of the connecting installation cannot be found, it should be added to Section A.IV.
- e) **Sum of measurable heat available at installation** in TJ per year. This is the sum of the amount of measurable heat produced (a), the net imported measurable heat from ETS installations (b) and non-ETS entities (c). *The NIMs baseline data template automatically calculates this amount.*
- f) **Ratio of “ETS heat” to “Total heat”** in %. “ETS heat” is the sum of the measurable heat produced in the installation (point (a)) and the measurable heat imported from other ETS installations (point (b)). “Total heat” is the measurable heat specified under point (e). *The NIMs baseline data template automatically calculates this amount.* This ratio is only needed in case it is not feasible to clearly earmark which

shares of individual heat flows are produced within and outside the boundaries of ETS installations.

Next the operator needs to assess which part of the measurable heat is not eligible for free allocation under a heat benchmark sub-installation. *See Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches for guidance on this topic.*

The operator should therefore ensure that the following data, relating to **heat not falling under heat benchmark sub-installations**, are specified:

- g) **Measurable heat consumed for electricity production within the installation** (not eligible for free allocation under the heat benchmark sub-installation). This includes:
 - i. Measurable heat used for electricity production in TJ per year.
 - ii. The amount of this heat that is provided by non-ETS sources, in TJ per year. By default, the ratio determined under point (f) is used to calculate this amount. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically performs this calculation.*
 - iii. If more precise information on the amount of heat from non-ETS sources is available (e.g., because steam from different sources can be distinguished due to different pressure levels), the values calculated in point g.ii can be modified here using a manual override. If this amount exceeds the amount indicated in point (c)iv, the available maximum value will be used for further calculation.
- h) **Measurable heat consumed for product benchmark sub-installations within the installation** (not eligible for free allocation under the heat benchmark sub-installation), in TJ per year: the operator should check this amount for plausibility by comparing it to the total amount of heat from non-ETS sources in product benchmark sub-installations as requested in Section F.I.1(g) (“Heat imported from non-ETS installations or entities”) and to the total net import from non-ETS entities (E.II(c), “Measurable heat imported from installations and entities not covered by the EU ETS”). *The NIMs baseline data template facilitates the plausibility check by automatically showing the non-ETS heat consumption in product benchmark sub-installations under point F.I.1(g).ii. It is recommended to first fill in data for Sheet “F_ProductBM” before continuing with this part of the template, to ensure that the plausibility check is correctly carried out.*

In relatively complex installations, it will not be straightforward to assess how much heat is used in electricity production, product benchmark sub-installations and other sub-installations. A production process consuming heat may for instance be used to produce both product benchmarked and non-products-benchmarked products. In such cases, the attribution of heat consumption to different uses should be made on a fair basis (such as shares of operating time or production volumes combined with specific heat use related to different products). The operator should report to the CA in detail on the way that the attribution of heat use was made, based on the monitoring methodology plan. In case of uncertainty, the attribution should be biased such that more heat is attributed to the product benchmark sub-installation. In general, the attribution of heat use should be consistent with the attribution of emissions and fuel use to different uses as discussed in Sections D.II.2 (“Attribution

to sub-installations”) and E.I.1 (“Overview and split into use categories”) respectively (only if those sections are relevant for the installation under consideration).

- i) **Heat export to each ETS installations** (not eligible for free allocation under the heat benchmark sub-installation) in TJ per year. The name of installations is to be selected from the drop-down list, which is based on the list of technical connections described in Section A.IV (“List of technical connections”). If the name of the connecting installation cannot be found, it should be added to Section A.IV. The amount of heat export should not be greater than the total amount of measurable heat available in the installation (see Section E.II.(e), “Sum of measurable heat available at installation”).

The operator then needs to calculate the amount of measurable heat which is part of a **heat benchmark or district heating sub-installation**. See *Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches for guidance on this topic*. The following data are calculated automatically by the NIMs baseline data template.

- j) **Sub-total: remaining total measurable heat, potentially belonging to heat benchmark sub-installations**, split in a share eligible by origin and not eligible by origin (in line with the definitions provided previously), so more specifically:
 - i. Determine the amount of heat available in the installation (point (e)), not used for electricity (point (g)), not used in product benchmark sub-installations (point (h)) and not exported to other ETS installations (point (i)); so the value is calculated as: $I-(g)-(h)-(i)$.
 - ii. Determine the heat eligible by origin in TJ per year. The calculation of the amount of heat not eligible is specified under iii below. The amount of heat that is eligible is the difference between i and iii.
 - iii. Determine the amount of heat not-eligible by origin in TJ per year. This amount is equal to the sum of heat imported from non-ETS installations (c.iv) minus the amount of non-ETS heat used for electricity production (g.ii) minus the amount of non-ETS heat used in product benchmarks (h.xi).
- k) Determine the **eligibility ratio** in %. This is equal to $(j).ii/(j).i$ (see above).

The operator should then provide:

- l) The **net amount of measurable heat consumed within the installation** and eligible under the heat benchmark, in TJ per year, outside the boundaries of product benchmarks and not for electricity production.
- m) The **heat exported to installations or entities not covered by the EU ETS** (e.g., district heating networks), in TJ per year. Where heat is exported to complex heating networks, the network itself may be regarded as a non-ETS entity. See *Guidance Document 6 on cross-boundary heat flows for more guidance on allocation in case of complex heat networks*. The name of installations is to be selected from the drop-down list, which is based on the list of technical connections described in Section A.IV (“List of technical connections”). If the name of the connecting installation cannot be found, it should be added to Section A.IV.

- n) The **heat losses** in TJ per year and as a share of the available heat under (e). *This value is provided for reasons of completeness of the heat balance. The NIMs baseline data template automatically determines this amount and share. If negative values are displayed, this means that the heat consumption levels entered above exceed the amount of heat available from production and imports.*
- o) **Total amount of measurable heat potentially part of a heat benchmark or district heating sub-installation** in TJ per year. This amount is the sum of the quantities specified under points (l) and (m). *The NIMs baseline data template performs this calculation automatically.*
- p) The **final result is the amount of measurable heat attributable to the heat benchmark or district heating sub-installations** in TJ per year. This amount is equal to the amount calculated under point (o) multiplied by the ratio calculated under point (k). *The NIMs baseline data template performs this calculation automatically. The maximum value allowed is the eligible amount identified under point (j).i.*

Finally, the operator should attribute the measurable heat under point (o) to the different sub-installations. *See below for more guidance on the use of the NIMs baseline data template.*

- q) The operator should first select the **input method** (either percentages or absolute values) and then complete the attribution.
- r) **Attribution of heat sub-installations to Carbon Leakage exposure levels and to the district heating sub-installation.** Here the amount of measurable heat which is consumed by each sub-installation is identified, where 100% refers to the sum calculated under point (o):
 - i. A heat benchmark sub-installation deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM good (“Heat benchmark sub-installation (CL | non-CBAM)”). The measurable heat to be attributed to this sub-installation is equal to:
 - The measurable heat not used for electricity production or in product benchmark sub-installations that is consumed by production processes deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and that do not produce a CBAM good (in TJ per year).
PLUS
 - The heat export to non-ETS entities that are deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage¹⁸ and that do not produce a CBAM good (in TJ per year).
MULTIPLIED BY
 - The ratio of heat eligible for free allocation, calculated under point (k))
 - ii. A heat benchmark sub-installation not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM good (“Heat benchmark sub-

¹⁸ Non-ETS entities are by default deemed not exposed to carbon leakage. The carbon leakage exposure factor for carbon leakage exposed sectors can only be used if the heat exporter provides satisfactory evidence that it exports heat to a non-ETS entity that is exposed to a risk of carbon leakage: the operator will for example provide a list of his customers consuming the heat, along with the NACE codes of these customers and the amounts of heat delivered to them.

installation (non-CL | non-CBAM”). The measurable heat to be attributed to this sub-installation is equal to:

- The measurable heat not used for electricity production or in product benchmark sub-installations that is consumed by production processes not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and not producing a CBAM good (in TJ per year).
PLUS
 - The heat export to non-ETS entities that are not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage¹⁸ and that do not produce a CBAM good (in TJ per year).
MULTIPLIED BY
 - The ratio of heat eligible for free allocation calculated under point (k))
- iii. A Heat benchmark sub-installation deemed exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a CBAM good (“Heat benchmark sub-installation (CL | CBAM)”). The measurable heat to be attributed to this sub-installation is equal to:
- The measurable heat not used for electricity production or in product benchmark sub-installations that is consumed by production processes deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a CBAM good (in TJ per year).
PLUS
 - The heat export to non-ETS entities that are deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage¹⁹ and that produce a CBAM good (in TJ per year).
MULTIPLIED BY
 - The ratio of heat eligible for free allocation, calculated under point (k))
- iv. A district heating sub-installation. The measurable heat to be attributed to this sub-installation is equal to:
- The measurable heat exported for the purpose of district heating or cooling.

The operator should check that:

- The sum of the measurable heat attributed to the three sub-installations is equal to the amount of measurable heat calculated under point (o).
- The sum of the heat export to non-ETS entities is equal to the sum of the amounts specified under point (m).
- The sum of the consumed measurable heat not used for electricity production or in product benchmark sub-installations is equal to the amount specified under point (l).

¹⁹ Non-ETS entities are by default deemed not exposed to carbon leakage. The carbon leakage exposure factor for carbon leakage exposed sectors can only be used if the heat exporter provides satisfactory evidence that it exports heat to a non-ETS entity that is exposed to a risk of carbon leakage: the operator will for example provide a list of his customers consuming the heat, along with the NACE codes of these customers and the amounts of heat delivered to them.

E.III Waste gas balance

Complete balance of waste gases at the installation

This Part of the guidance describes how to report data relating to waste gas production and consumption. It is only mandatory if waste gases are relevant for the installation. The operator should therefore first indicate whether this section is relevant, by answering the question “Are any waste gases produced or consumed in, imported to or exported from this installation?”

If the answer to this question is “TRUE”, then the data included in this section should be provided; if the answer to this question is “FALSE”, then the operator can move on to the next section.

This balance is mainly used for consistency checking between related entries made in the “waste gas tool” in Section D.IV and the sub-installation level waste gas balances in Sheets F and G. Where possible, the template automatically fills in the data in this section.

In points (a) and (b), data relating to the waste gases produced within the system boundaries of a product benchmark sub-installations, as well as waste gases produced outside the system boundaries of a product benchmark sub-installation, respectively, are automatically copied from Sheets F and G.

In line (iv.) of the table in point (b), the operator is asked to indicate the total amounts of waste gas produced outside the system boundaries of a product benchmark sub-installation, which have been imported into the installation; in other words, the amount of waste gases included in line (iii.) of this table, which have not been produced within the installation. This is to avoid double counting in the waste gas balance. It should be noted that these same amounts are also to be included in point (d) here-after.

Point (c) sums the values to have the **total amount of waste gases produced** within the installation.

The operator should provide the following data:

- d) The **amount of waste gases imported from other installations or entities**, in TJ per year. A drop-down menu proposes the list of relevant installations or entities, based on data provided in Sheet A.IV. Please make sure that there is no double counting with (b) when imported amounts are included there.
- e) The **amount of waste gases exported to other installations or entities**, in TJ per year. A drop-down menu proposes the list of relevant installations or entities, based on data provided in Sheet A.IV.
- f) The **sum of waste gases available at the installation** is automatically calculated by the template and equal to $(c)+(d)-(e)$.
- g) The **amount of waste gases consumed within the product benchmark sub-installations** is automatically taken from Sheet F.

- h) The **amount of waste gases consumed within fall-back sub-installations** is automatically taken from Sheet G.
- i) The **amount of waste gases consumed for the production of electricity**, in TJ per year.
- j) The **amount of waste gases flared for reasons other than safety flaring**. The amount of waste gases produced outside any product benchmark sub-installation and flared for reasons other than for safety flaring should be provided in TJ per year in line (xi) of the table. The amount of waste gases produced within product benchmark sub-installations and flared for reasons other than for safety flaring is taken automatically from Sheet F.
- k) The **amount of waste gases consumed for the production of measurable heat AND exported to other EU ETS installations**. Here the operator should include only waste gases consumed within the installation to produce measurable heat which is exported to other EU ETS installations. Waste gases that are directly exported should be included under point (e) above, and not in this sub-section.
- l) The template automatically performs a **plausibility check** on the full waste gas balance, with an absolute value of the identified difference provided both in TJ per year and as a percentage of the amount of waste gases available at the installation (i.e., (f)).

E.IV Electricity

Complete balance of electricity at the installation

This Part of the guidance describes how to report data relating to electricity production and consumption.

Point (a), indicating **whether the installation produces electricity** or not, and point (f) indicating the total net electricity consumed in the installation are both mandatory for all installations, even those that do not produce electricity.

The remainder of this section of the template is mandatory only for installations that produce electricity (i.e., True indicated as answer for point (a)). An exception is made for installations which produce electricity only from emergency power units, which may select False for point (a), and for which the remainder of this section will thus remain optional.

If the installation produces electricity, the operator should ensure that the following data are specified:

- b) The **total net amount of electricity produced in the installation**. This should be split between electricity produced from fuels (both fossil fuels and biomass) and electricity generated by other technologies: e.g., hydropower, wind power and solar power. The sum of both should be equal to the total electricity production by the installation. Electricity production should be expressed in net MWh produced per year. (These data need to be consistent with data in the CHP tool on Sheet D).

- c) The **total net electricity imported from the grid or from other installations** in MWh per year.
- d) The **total net electricity exported to the grid or to other installations** in MWh per year.
- e) The **total electricity available for use in the installation**. These values are automatically calculated by the template. This is calculated as: $(b)+(c)-(d)$.
- f) The **total net electricity consumed in the installation** in MWh per year.
- g) The sum of electricity input into Sheet "F_ProductBM" for relevant electricity consumption is copied here to allow for a **plausibility check**, comparing these values to those provided in point (f).

F “Product BM” – Sub-installation data relating to product benchmarks

This Part of the guidance document describes how to report data relating to product benchmark sub-installations.

F.1 Historical Activity Levels and disaggregated production details

These data will serve two purposes: the determination of the amount of free allocation based on product benchmark sub-installations, and the determination of the improvement rates for product benchmark values. The operator should only report data on sub-installations that are present in the installation, and therefore this Sheet is not relevant for installations that do not contain product benchmark sub-installations. For each product benchmark sub-installation included in the installation, one specific section should be filled in.

F. Sheet "ProductBM" - SUB-INSTALLATION DATA RELATING TO PRODUCT BENCHMARKS

The navigation bar above only contains links to the relevant sub-installations listed in section A.III.1.

I Historic Activity levels and disaggregated production details

1 Sub-installation with product benchmark: Sulphite pulp, thermo-mechanical and mechanical pulp
The name of the product benchmark sub-installation is displayed automatically based on the inputs in sheet "A_InstallationData".

This sheet serves the following two purposes:

- data needed to determine the amount of free allocation of product benchmark sub-installations;
- data needed to determine improvement rates of product benchmark values.

(a) Historic activity levels
Under this point the "main activity levels" should be reported, i.e. the data which is directly applicable for the calculation of the allocation. Usually this is the production data of the product, e.g. tonnes of grey cement clinker or tonnes of glass bottles, as defined by Annex I of the FAR. However, if a message appears under point (b), the appropriate calculation tool has to be used, and its results are automatically copied into this table under (ii). Based on the start of normal operation entered in A.III., it will be automatically determined if this sub-installation has been operating for less than one year in the baseline period. If this is the case, the historic activity level will be determined based on the first calendar year after the start of normal operation, pursuant to the third sub-paragraph of Article 15(7).

(b) Special reporting requirements: Note that for integrated pulp & paper production special allocation rules apply (Article 16(6) of the FAR). Some product benchmarks require special information to be reported (e.g. CWI values). If relevant, an automatically generated message will appear here.

(c) Electricity consumption
Please enter here the electricity consumed within the system boundaries of this sub-installation. For product benchmarks listed in section 2 of Annex I of the FAR, entries here are mandatory and have to correspond to the related system boundaries indicated in that section.

(d) Heat imported from non-ETS installations or entities: If not relevant at your installation, continue with the next points. Pursuant to Article 21 of the FAR, an amount of emissions has to be deducted from the preliminary annual allocation from product-benchmark sub-installations. That amount is the amount of measurable heat imported from non-ETS installations (including any heat from nitric acid sub-installations) or entities multiplied with the heat benchmark. Please enter the appropriate values here. Note that the values have to be consistent with the sub-totals for import from non-ETS under point E.ii.c in sheet "E_Energy flows". The data must also be consistent with the total net measurable heat imported entered under point (k) i below.

In most cases, the data requested are annual values. Data can be derived from a range of data sources. See *Guidance Document 5 on Monitoring & Reporting for the FAR* for more guidance on this topic.

In the NIMs baseline data template, the name of the product benchmark sub-installation is automatically displayed based on the inputs in Section A.III.1 (“Product benchmark sub-installations”)

The operator should specify:

- Annual historical activity levels:** the annual historical activity level for product benchmark sub-installations is the annual production of the product. The unit to be used will depend on the product benchmark, as defined in Annex I of the FAR (e.g., tonnes of grey cement clinker, or air dried tonnes for short fibre kraft pulp).

For some product benchmark sub-installations, the historical activity level needs to be calculated according to a special methodology. The relevant methodologies are specified in Annex III of the FAR. Point (b) here-after will automatically indicate if such a methodology should be applied. The template will automatically determine, based on the start of normal operation indicated in Section A.III, whether the sub-installation has been operating for less than one year during the baseline period. If this is the case, the historic activity level will be determined based on the first calendar year after the start of normal operation, in line with the third sub-paragraph of Article 15(7).

- b) In the NIMs baseline data template, the need to follow a **special methodology** to calculate the historical activity level is automatically shown under (b). This can for example be CWT values. *For more guidance on product definitions, unit of production and special methodologies, see Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance. See Section H in this document for guidance on data collections for special methodologies. In the NIMs baseline data template, the historical activity levels according to special methodologies should be calculated in Sheet H, it is then automatically copied in this Sheet.*
- c) **Relevant electricity consumption** of the sub-installation. For product benchmarks listed in section 2 of Annex I of the FAR, entries here are mandatory and have to correspond to the related system boundaries indicated in that section. *See Annex I.2 of the FAR for formal definitions of system boundaries and Guidance document 9 with sector-specific guidance for additional guidance.*
- d) Measurable **heat imported from non-ETS installations or entities**: heat import from non-ETS entities is not eligible for free allocation. Pursuant to Article 21 to the FAR, an amount of emissions has to be deducted from the preliminary annual free allocation of product benchmark sub-installations in the case of heat import from non-ETS entities, corresponding to the amount of emissions from measurable heat imported from non-ETS installations or entities or from nitric acid sub-installations, multiplied by the heat benchmark. To allow this deduction, the operator should specify the net measurable heat imported from non-ETS or from nitric acid sub-installations, defined as the consumed measurable heat produced outside the scope of the EU ETS in TJ per year. *See Guidance Document 6 on cross-boundary heat flows for additional guidance on the definition of net measurable heat import.*

If feasible, this amount should be specified based on the configuration of the steam system. If this is not feasible, it should be obtained by multiplying the measurable heat consumption of the product benchmark sub-installation by the ratio of “ETS heat” to “Total heat” as determined in Section E.II.2.e.

The operator should check that the values are consistent with the sub-totals for import from non-ETS under Section E.II(c) in Sheet E, as well as with the total net measurable heat imported entered under point (k).i below. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically performs these checks and calculates the reduction in allocation. See Guidance Document 6 on cross-boundary heat flows for more guidance on allocation in case of heat import from non-ETS entities.*

Production details

Annex I to the FAR lists the formal definitions of the products covered by a product benchmark sub-installation. See *Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for more guidance on product definitions*. These definitions may however encompass multiple products or product groups. The operator should therefore:

- e) **Identify the products included in the product benchmark sub-installation**, as well as the corresponding PRODCOM codes. This will allow the competent authority to check if the boundaries defined for this product benchmark are respected. PRODCOM 2010 codes should be used. *A list of these codes can be found at:*

- f) Provide **individual production levels for products included in this product benchmark sub-installation**. The data should be based on the PRODCOM 2010 references identified in point (h). For each product, the operator should indicate:
 - The relevant **PRODCOM 2010** code for the product. The PRODCOM codes should be entered in the format “nnnnnnnn”, i.e., without any dots or other delimiters between the numbers. Only if PRODCOM codes are not available for the specific product should 4-digit level NACE codes be provided, in the format “nnnn”.
 - The **name of product or group of products** produced.
 - The unit in which the production levels are provided (i.e., tonne, etc.).
 - The annual production levels.

(e) Identification of products included in this product benchmark sub-installation

A product benchmark can encompass several similar products (or product groups). In some cases intermediates can be relevant for allocation purposes. The relevant products must be identified here in order to allow the competent authority to check if the boundaries defined for this product benchmark are respected.

PRODCOM codes shall be entered in the form “nnnnnnnn”, i.e. without any dots or other delimiters in between. Only if PRODCOM are not available, at least a 4-digit level NACE code should be provided in the form of “nnnn”.

Data required for the determination of the benchmark improvement rate pursuant to Article 10a(2) of the Directive.

The data provided in this box will be used for the update of the benchmark values. The emissions related to measurable heat, heat losses, non-measurable heat and waste gases have to be attributed to the different sub-installations, in accordance with Section 10 of Annex VII of the FAR.

The name of the sub-installation is automatically copied from Section III.1 in Sheet A. Based on the data entered in this box, the attributable emissions will be calculated in Section K.III.2 of the summary Sheet.

This section follows the principles set out in sections 4.3 and 7.3 of Guidance Document 5, especially for all parameters used to determine the emissions attributed to each sub-installation (see *AttrEm* formula below). Table 2 below links each element of the *AttrEm* formula with the relevant sections in the baseline data collection and MMP templates, as well as with the relevant examples shown in this Part of the guidance document.

g) **Direct emissions attributable to this sub-installation (*DirEm** (*MP source streams*))**: the total direct emissions should be provided for each year in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year. The following provisions should be taken into account:

- The direct emissions are monitored in line with the MP (Monitoring Plan) approved under the MRR, i.e., taking into account the emissions from calculation based methodologies (using source streams), measurement based methodologies (CEMS) as well as no-tier approaches (“fall-backs”). However, in several situations the “direct emissions” in this section are not identical to those reported under the MRR. Such situations include e.g., source streams used for the production of measurable heat, waste gases etc. In other words, care must be taken when filling the sections below to strictly follow the instructions in order to avoid double counting or omissions.
- Measurable heat: where the heat is exclusively produced for one sub-installation, the emissions may be directly attributed here via the fuel’s emissions. Wherever fuels are used to produce measurable heat which is consumed in more than one sub-installation (which includes situations with imports from and exports to other installations), the fuels should not be included in the direct emissions of the sub-installation but under point (k) below. "Imports" include measurable heat from a unit (e.g., a central power house at the installation, or a more complex steam network with several heat producing units) that supplies heat to more than one sub-installation. In such a case, emissions should also not be attributed here but under point (k).i. below.
- Measurable heat exported: where such heat is recovered from the process and exported to another sub-installation in the installation or outside the installation, no corrections should be made here. The deduction for the associated emissions will be done based on entries under point (k).v. below.
- Waste gases: emissions from waste gases which are IMPORTED from other installations and consumed in this sub-installation, should not be included here but under point (l) below.

The specific emissions factors (EF) should take into account the provisions in FAR Annex VII chapters 8 and 10, in particular sections 10.1.2 and 10.1.3.

h) **Energy input to this sub-installation and relevant emission factor (*Parameter: Energy input*)**: in line with Annex IV, section 2.4(a) of the FAR, the following should be provided: the total energy input in TJ per year, and the corresponding weighted emissions factor in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ, taking into account the related

 Data provided here will impact the attributable emissions in accordance with section 10.1.1 of Annex VII of the FAR.

It is important to note that any source streams should only be listed here if they are not already covered by the direct emissions under (g) above to avoid any data gaps or double counting. Emissions associated with waste gases should NOT be listed here but under (f) below.

Please enter here information on the so-called internal source streams, that are transferred between sub-installations, i.e. imported to or exported from this sub-installation.

For example, if this is the "coke" sub-installation of an integrated iron&steel plant, emissions associated with the consumption of coke occur in the blast furnace and should not be attributed to this (i.e. the "coke") sub-installation. Nevertheless, a part of the emissions will be included under (g) above, because coal entering the coke oven will be one of the source streams attributed there in the first step.

In order to avoid double counting, a correction needs to be made for the coke leaving the coke sub-installation as outgoing "internal source stream". i) **Further internal source streams imported to or exported from this sub-installation (and not covered under (g)) (DirEm* (internal source stream)):** data relating to internal source streams transferred between sub-installations (i.e., imported to or exported from this sub-installation) and not included in previous data should be included here.

For example, if this is the "coke" sub-installation of an integrated iron and steel plant, emissions associated with the consumption of coke occur in the blast furnace and should not be attributed to this (i.e., "coke") sub-installation. Nevertheless, a part of the emissions will be included under point (g) above, because coal entering the coke oven will be one of the source streams attributed here in the first step. In order to avoid double counting, a correction needs to be made for the coke leaving the coke sub-installation as an outgoing "internal source stream". This is done by a negative value for the coke amount figure in the case of an "export". For giving a complete balance of the emissions of the coal entering the coke sub-installation, emissions associated with the use of coke oven gas (i.e., a waste gas) are already covered under point (g) above (as included

in the emissions from coal) to the extent that the gas is used within this sub-installation. Corrections to account for the exported amounts of the waste gas should not be made here, but under point (l).xx below.

Conversely, if this is the hot metal benchmark sub-installation in an integrated iron and steel plant, coke needs to be listed here as ingoing/imported “internal” source stream with positive amounts.

It is important to note that source streams should only be listed here if they are not already covered by the direct emissions under point (g) to avoid data gaps or double counting. Furthermore, emissions associated with either the production or the consumption of waste gases should NOT be listed here but under point (l).xx. below.

The operator should indicate:

- i. Whether or not such source streams are relevant for this sub-installation. The template allows for two types of source streams; if there are more than two source streams imported or exported, multiple source streams should be grouped together and respective names provided.
- ii. A name representing the source stream should be given.

The following annual data should be provided:

- iii. Amount imported or exported in tonnes per year
 - iv. Net calorific value if applicable, in GJ per tonne
 - v. Carbon content in mass percentage
 - vi. Biomass content, as fraction of carbon, in percentage
 - vii. Fossil emissions, in tonnes of CO₂ per year – this is automatically calculated by the template
 - viii. Biomass emissions, in tonnes of CO₂ per year – this is automatically calculated by the template
 - ix. Energy content in TJ per year – this is automatically calculated by the template
 - x. In the last line of the table, an error message is provided if data is incomplete or inconsistent.
- j) **Amount of GHG imported or exported as feedstock (*DirEm* (CO₂ feedstock)*):** the amount of greenhouse gas imported or exported (from/to another sub-installation in the installation, or from/to outside the installation) should be provided in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year, in line with Annex IV, section 3.1(k) of the FAR, and with the rules set out in the M&R Regulation. Exported amounts should be entered as negative values and correspond to CO₂ that is exported and not released to the atmosphere by this sub-installation.
- k) **Measurable heat import to and export from this sub-installation** (from/to another sub-installation in the installation, or to/from outside the installation). The following data should be provided:
- i. Total net heat imported, in TJ per year.
 - ii. Specific emissions factor for the imported heat in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ (i. multiplied by ii. results in *Em_{H,import}*).
 - iii. Amount of net heat imported from pulp sub-installations in TJ per year (*Parameter: Heat from pulp*). See *Guidance Document 6 on cross-*

boundary heat flows, and Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for more information on this topic.

- iv. Amount of heat imported from nitric acid sub-installation in TJ per year (*Parameter: Heat from nitric acid*). See *Guidance Document 6 on cross-boundary heat flows, and Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for more information on this topic.*
- v. Total net heat exported, in TJ per year. Any export of measurable heat (e.g., steam) from product benchmark sub-installations should be reported and deducted as exported heat using this line, regardless of whether it is used in other (sub-)installations or for the production of electricity. This also applies to any electricity produced from that steam, including from the black liquor combustion in pulp industries.
- vi. Specific emissions factor for the exported heat in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ. (points v. and vi. combine for *Em_{H,export}*). If the emissions factor associated with the export of heat from a product benchmark sub-installation is not known or is not clearly defined (e.g., in the case of recovered waste heat), it will be based on the updated heat benchmark value. In that case, this line should be left empty. If on the other hand the emissions factor is known and clearly defined, the preferred option is that the operator enters the known value here.

The specific emissions factors (EF) associated with the heat should take into account the provisions in FAR Annex VII sections 8 and 10, in particular sections 10.1.2 and 10.1.3.

For attributing emissions from cogeneration to production of heat and electricity, the “CHP tool” in Section III of Sheet D should be used.

- l) **Waste gas balance for this sub-installation.** The following data should be provided:

- i. Whether or not waste gases are **relevant** for this sub-installation. If this is not the case, no data needs to be provided in this section.

Types of waste gases produced (*Parameter: Waste gases produced*)

- ii. Types of waste gases produced. Here a name or description of the waste gas should be provided.

The following data relate to the waste gases produced. Data provided here is only used for consistency checking and have no direct impact on either the attributable emissions or the allocation.

- iii. Amounts produced: the data may be reported either in tonnes or in 1000 Nm³ (the unit can be changed via a drop-down menu). The units must be consistent with those for the net calorific value and emission factor given here-after.
- iv. Net calorific value: the unit in which the data are reported (GJ per 1000Nm³, or GJ per tonnes) should be consistent with the unit chosen in point (iii); this is automatically ensured by the template.
- v. Waste gas produced: the amount of waste gas produced in TJ per year is automatically calculated by the template. This amount should be consistent with Section E.III.(a).

- vi. Specific emissions factor of the produced waste gas in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.

Types of waste gases consumed (*Parameter: Waste gases consumed*)

- vii. Types of waste gases consumed. Here a name or description of the waste gas should be provided.

The following data relate to the waste gases consumed. This includes all types of waste gases that are consumed by this sub-installation for the purpose of the production of measurable heat, non-measurable heat (including safety flaring) or mechanical energy (other than for electricity). Amounts that are flared for reasons other than for safety flaring should be reported under point (viii.) here-after. Data provided here is only used for consistency checking and have no direct impact on either the attributable emissions or the allocation.

- viii. Amounts consumed: the data may be reported either in tonnes or in 1000 Nm³ (the unit can be changed via a drop-down menu). The units must be consistent with those for the net calorific value and emission factor given here-after.
- ix. Net calorific value: the unit in which the data are reported (GJ per 1000Nm³, or GJ per tonnes) should be consistent with the unit chosen in point (viii); this is automatically ensured by the template.
- x. Waste gas consumed: the amount of waste gas consumed in TJ per year is automatically calculated by the template. This amount should be consistent with Section E.III.(g)
- xi. Specific emissions factor of the consumed waste gas in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.

Types of waste gases flared (*Parameter: Waste gases flared*)

- xii. Types of waste gases flared. Here a name or description of the waste gas should be provided.

The following data relate to the waste gases flared. This includes all types of waste gases that are ultimately flared for reasons other than for safety flaring, either within or outside this sub-installation. Data provided here is used for consistency checking and have no direct impact on the attributable emissions. However, as of 2026, allocation will be reduced with respect to flaring of waste gases other than for safety flaring. *See Guidance Document 8 on waste gases and process emission sub-installations for more information on this topic.*

- xiii. Amounts flared: the data may be reported either in tonnes or in 1000 Nm³ (the unit can be changed via a drop-down menu). The units must be consistent with those for the net calorific value and emissions factor given here-after.
- xiv. Net calorific value: the unit in which the data are reported (GJ per 1000Nm³, or GJ per tonnes) should be consistent with the unit chosen in point (xiii); this is automatically ensured by the template.
- xv. Waste gas flared: the amount of waste gas flared in TJ per year is automatically calculated by the template. This amount should be consistent with Section E.III.(j).
- xvi. Specific emissions factor of the flared waste gas in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.

Types of waste gases imported (data entered here is used for $WG_{corr,import}$)

xvii. Types of waste gases imported. Here a name or description of the waste gas should be provided.

The following data relate to the waste gases imported. This includes all types of waste gases that are produced outside the system boundaries of this sub-installation, but imported into this sub-installation and used for the production of measurable heat, non-measurable heat (including safety flaring) or mechanical energy (other than for electricity).

- xviii. Amounts imported: the data may be reported either in tonnes or in 1000 Nm³ (the unit can be changed via a drop-down menu). The units must be consistent with those for the net calorific value and emission factor given here-after.
- xix. Net calorific value: the unit in which the data are reported (GJ per 1000Nm³, or GJ per tonnes) should be consistent with the unit chosen in (xviii); this is automatically ensured by the template.
- xx. Waste gas imported: the amount of waste gas imported in TJ per year is automatically calculated by the template.
- xxi. Specific emissions factor of the imported waste gas in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.

Types of waste gases exported (data entered here is used for $WG_{corr,export}$)

xxii. Types of waste gases exported. Here a name or description of the waste gas should be provided.

The following data relate to the waste gases exported. This includes all types of waste gases that are produced within the system boundaries of this sub-installation and exported from this sub-installation to any other sub-installation, or to any other installations or entities.

- xxiii. Amounts exported: the data may be reported either in tonnes or in 1000 Nm³ (the unit can be changed via a drop-down menu). The units must be consistent with those for the net calorific value and emission factor given here-after.
- xxiv. Net calorific value: the unit in which the data are reported (GJ per 1000Nm³, or GJ per tonnes) should be consistent with the unit chosen in (xxiii); this is automatically ensured by the template.
- xxv. Waste gas exported: the amount of waste gas exported in TJ per year is automatically calculated by the template.
- xxvi. Specific emissions factor of the exported waste gas in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.
- m) **Electricity production ($Em_{el,prod}$):** the amount of electricity produced directly from this sub-installation should be indicated in MWh per year. This includes electricity that is produced directly from this sub-installation, in line with Annex IV, section 3.1(i) of the FAR. Any electricity that is produced via intermediate measurable heat should not be listed here but under export of measurable heat under point (k).v.
- n) **Total amount of pulp produced (Parameter: Total pulp produced):** in line with section 2.4(k) of Annex IV of the FAR, the total amount of pulp produced for the

short fibre kraft pulp, long fibre kraft pulp, sulphite pulp, thermo-mechanical pulp and mechanical pulp product benchmark sub-installations should be reported. If this product benchmark sub-installation is among those listed in the previous sentence, the number of tonnes per year should be indicated. If this is not the case, this table will be automatically greyed out by the template.

o) Import or export of intermediate products covered by product benchmarks (*Parameter: Intermediate products*). In order to avoid any double counting or gaps in attributed emissions when determining the updated benchmarks, the following information should be provided, in line with Annex IV, section 2.7(d) of the FAR:

- i. Whether any import or export of intermediate products is covered by the product benchmark. If this is the case, then the following data should be provided, where relevant:
- ii. Imported amounts in tonnes.
- iii. Exported amounts in tonnes.
- iv. A description of the intermediate products which are imported or exported.

G “Fall-back” – Sub-installation data relating to fall-back sub-installations

This Part of the guidance document describes how to report on disaggregated production details for the fall-back approaches.

G.I Historic Activity Levels and disaggregated production details

There can be a maximum of 10 sub-installations that can be reported: three heat benchmark sub-installations, three fuel benchmark sub-installations, and three process emissions sub-installations – with one of each deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM product, one each not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM product, and one each deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a CBAM product – plus one district heat sub-installation. These data will serve two purposes: the determination of the amount of free allocation based on fall-back benchmark sub-installations, and the determination of the improvement rates for fall-back benchmark values. *See Guidance Document 1 on general guidance for a discussion on the maximum number of sub-installations with fall-back approaches. For more information on how to define sub-installations please refer to Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches.*

Operators should only report data on sub-installations that are present in the installation.

Operators should ensure that data are correctly filled in for this Sheet, as they may be used in the future to check energy efficiency provisions during adjustments due to activity level changes.

In most cases, the data requested are annual values. Data can be derived from a range of data sources. *See Guidance Document 5 on Monitoring & Reporting for the FAR for more guidance on this topic.*

In the NIMs baseline data template, each section in this Sheet starts with an overview of historical activity levels taken from Sheet E: ‘EnergyFlows’.

G.I.1 Fall-Back Sub-installation 1, heat benchmark carbon leakage, non-CBAM

This section applies to sub-installations covered by a heat benchmark, deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, and producing a non-CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the reporting installation, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

Historical activity levels are automatically copied from Sheet E_EnergyFlows, Section E.II.r. The template automatically determines, based on the start of normal operation indicated in Section A.III, whether the sub-installation has been operating for less than one year during the baseline period. If this is the case, the historic activity level will be

determined based on the first calendar year after the start of normal operation, in line with the third sub-paragraph of FAR Article 15(7).

Production details

The operator should specify to which production processes or services, the sub-installation relates. These should, to the extent feasible, be defined by physical units and processes. They may include the following:

- Production of goods not covered by product benchmarks within the installation (please state types of products);
- Production of mechanical energy, heating or cooling (all uses excluding production of electricity);
- Export of heat to installations or other entities (other than for district heating). In this case, please indicate the use of heat in the receiving installation or entity, if known.

More specifically the operator should specify:

Please list here to which production processes or services this sub-installation relates. This may include the following items:

- Production of goods not covered by product benchmarks within the installation (please provide types of product);
- production of mechanical energy, heating or cooling (all uses excluding production of electricity);
- export of heat to installations or other entities (other than district heating). In this case please indicate the use of heat in that installation or entity, if known

PRODCOM codes shall be entered in the form "xxxxxxx", i.e. without any dots or other delimiters in between. Only if PRODCOM are not available, at least a 4-digit level NACE code should be provided in the form of "nnnn".

b) Identification of relevant products or services associated with this sub-installation:

- Use type: The different types are: “production of goods”, “production of mechanical energy”, “heating” and “cooling” for all uses except for the production of electricity; In some case the sub-installation covers installations or parts of an installation that are outside the boundaries of the installation being assessed. In this case it is possible that the use of the measurable heat in the external installation is not known; if this is the case, the operators should select the type as “unknown” from the drop-down menu. *The NIMs baseline data template facilitates the selection of type by providing a drop-down menu.*

- Whether the heat is consumed within the installation or exported to a non-ETS entity. The list of connecting installations is provided in a drop-down menu, based on the information indicated in Sheet A. Note that heat export to an ETS installation can by definition not be included in a heat benchmark sub-installation. *See Guidance Document 6 on Cross-boundary heat flows for more guidance on this topic.*
- The name of the product for which the heat is consumed, or heat export for uses other than “district heating”.
- The relevant **PRODCOM 2010** code for the activity related to the heat consumption or heat export to non-ETS entities.²¹ *A list of PRODCOM 2010 codes can be found at:*
http://ec.europa.eu/eurostat/ramon/nomenclatures/index.cfm?TargetUrl=LST_CLS_DLD&StrNom=PRD_2010&StrLanguageCode=EN&StrLayoutCode=HIERARCHIC.
 The PRODCOM codes should be entered in the format “nnnnnnnn”, i.e., without any dots or other delimiters between the numbers. If PRODCOM codes are not available for the specific product, 4-digit level NACE codes should be provided, in the format “nnnn”. NACE codes can also be used instead of PRODCOM codes if several similar products within the same NACE sector are covered. The PRODCOM/NACE codes should be used to verify the carbon leakage status of activities within the sub-installation. Note that in the case of heat export to non-ETS entities, the carbon leakage exposure factor for carbon leakage exposed sectors can only be used if the heat exporter provides satisfactory evidence that it exports heat to a non-ETS entity that is exposed to a risk of carbon leakage: the operator will for example provide a list of its customers consuming the heat, the NACE codes of these customers, and the amounts of heat delivered to them.
- The CN codes relating to the product(s) produced. The CN codes to be used are those defined under Regulation (EEC) No 2658/87. As indicated on the Taxation and Customs Union website, in the section on the Combined Nomenclature, “every year, Annex I to the basic CN Regulation (Council Regulation (EEC) No 2658/87 on the tariff and statistical nomenclature and on the Common Customs Tariff) is updated and published as a stand-alone Regulation in the EU’s Official Journal. Such updates take into account any changes that have been agreed at international level, either at the World Customs Organization (WCO) with regard to the Harmonized System (HS) nomenclature or within the framework of the World Trade Organization (WTO) with regard to conventional duty rates. Other changes may be required to reflect the evolution of, for example, commercial policy, technological or statistical requirements.”²²The CN codes are mandatory for

all sub-installations including non-CBAM sub-installations, as the latter will receive more free allowances than if they were CBAM sub-installations. Furthermore, these data will be valuable for the evaluation of the CBAM regulation.

Production levels: unit and production levels of each of the products or the amount of heat exported. This second table automatically copies the product name or heat export listed in the first table in point (b).

Data required for the determination of the benchmark improvement rate pursuant to Article 10a(2) of the Directive.

The data provided in this box will be used for the update of the benchmark values. The emissions related to measurable heat, heat losses, non-measurable heat and waste gases have to be attributed to the different sub-installations, in accordance with section 10 of Annex VII of the FAR.

This section follows the principles set out in sections 4.3 and 7.3 of Guidance Document 5, especially for all parameters used to determine the emissions attributed to each sub-installation (see *AttrEm* formula below). Table 2 on page 54 links each element of the *AttrEm* formula below with the relevant sections in the baseline data collection and MMP templates, as well as with the relevant examples shown in this Part of the guidance document.

$$AttrEm = DirEm^* + Em_{H,import} - Em_{H,export} + WG_{corr,import} - WG_{corr,export} - Em_{el,produced}$$

Based on the data entered in this box, the attributable emissions will be calculated in Section K.III.2 of the summary Sheet.

The operator should ensure that the following elements are provided:

- c) **Direct emissions attributable to this sub-installation (*DirEm** (MP source streams)):** the total direct emissions should be provided for each year in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent per year. The following provisions should be taken into account:
 - The direct emissions are monitored in line with the MP approved under the MRR, i.e., taking into account the emissions from calculation based methodologies (using source streams), measurement based methodologies (CEMS) as well as no-tier approaches (“fall-backs”). However, in several situations the “direct emissions” in this section are not identical to those reported under the MRR. Such situations include, e.g., source streams used for the production of measurable heat, waste gases etc. In other words, care must be taken to complete the sections here-after strictly following the instructions provided in order to avoid double counting or omissions.
 - Measurable heat: where the heat is exclusively produced for one sub-installation, the emissions may be directly attributed here via the fuel’s emissions. Wherever fuels are used to produce measurable heat which is

consumed in more than one sub-installation (e.g., a central power house at the installation, or a more complex steam network with several heat producing units), the fuels should not be included in the direct emissions of the sub-installation but under point (f).i. below.

- Waste gases: emissions associated with measurable heat produced from waste gases imported from other installations or sub-installations and used in this sub-installation should not be included here, but under point (f).xiii. here-after.
- d) **Energy input to this sub-installation and relevant emission factor:** the total energy input in TJ per year, and the corresponding weighted emissions factor in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ, taking into account related energy content of each fuel, should be provided, in line with section 2.4(a) of FAR Annex IV. The term "fuel" should be understood as any source stream in accordance with the M&R Regulation that is combustible and for which a net calorific value can be determined. The weighted emissions factor corresponds to the accumulated emissions from the fuels divided by the total energy content. The weighted emissions factor should furthermore include emissions from corresponding flue gas cleaning, if applicable. - Heat from pulp**: this includes measurable heat from sub-installations producing pulp.
- v. Amount of net heat imported from pulp benchmark sub-installations in TJ per year.
 - vi. Specific emissions factor for the imported heat in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.
- Heat from fuel benchmark**: this includes measurable heat recovered from waste heat from fuel BM sub-installations.
- vii. Amount of net heat imported from fuel benchmark sub-installations in TJ per year.
 - viii. Specific emissions factor for the imported heat in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.
- Heat from waste gases**: this includes measurable heat which is produced from waste gases.
- ix. Amount of net heat imported from waste gases in TJ per year.

- x. Specific emissions factor for the imported heat in tonnes of CO₂ per TJ.

G.I.2 Fall-Back Sub-installation 2, heat benchmark non-carbon leakage, non-CBAM

This section is for sub-installations covered by a heat benchmark but not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.1.

Operators should be careful and ensure that only activities not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage are included in this sub-installation.

G.I.3 Fall-Back Sub-installation 3, heat benchmark carbon leakage, CBAM

This section is for sub-installations covered by a heat benchmark, deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, and producing a CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.1.

G.I.4 Fall-Back Sub-installation 4, district heating

This section is for district heating sub-installations. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.1, with the exception of point (b), in which the use type is already indicated as District Heating, so there is no need to specify whether the heat is exported or not (it will always be exported to a district heating network); the name of the district heating network should be provided (instead of the name of the product for which the heat is consumed as given in Section G.I.1).

For more guidance on the definition of a district heating sub-installation see Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches

G.I.5 Fall-Back Sub-installation 5, fuel benchmark carbon leakage, non-CBAM

This section is for sub-installations covered by a fuel benchmark, deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, and producing a non-CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

The following guidance is specific to this sub-installation; for the remaining sections, the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.1 is to be provided:

- In point (b), there is no need to specify whether the fuel is consumed on-site or not (it will always be consumed on site), and the name of the product or heat export is replaced by the name of the product or service type: the operator should list here to which product processes or services this sub-installation relates, which may include the production of goods not covered by product benchmarks within the installation (in this case, the types of products should be indicated), or the production of mechanical energy, heating or cooling (all uses excluding production of electricity).
- In point (c), direct emissions monitored in line with the MP approved under the MRR, i.e., taking into account the emissions from calculation-based methodologies (using source streams), measurement based methodologies (CEMS) as well as no-tier approaches (“fall-backs”) should be entered. Emissions from the combustion of waste gases should however not be included here but under point (d).iii. here-after.
- In point (d), values for points i. and ii. are automatically calculated based on data entered in points (a) and (c). Under points iii. and iv. the fuel input from waste gases and the corresponding emissions factor has to be entered, respectively. Under points v. and vi., the electricity input for the primary purpose of heat production and the corresponding emissions factor have to be entered, respectively. However, the emissions factor may usually not be clearly defined or is not known, in which case corresponding entries are therefore optional here.
- In point (e), only the amount of net heat exported in TJ per year needs to be provided along with its specific emissions factor. This concerns any waste heat recovered and eligible for a heat benchmark or district heating sub-installation.

G.I.6 Fall-Back Sub-installation 6, fuel benchmark non-carbon leakage, non-CBAM

This section is for sub-installations covered by a fuel benchmark, not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.5.

Operators should be careful and ensure that only activities deemed not to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage are included in this sub-installation.

G.I.7 Fall-Back Sub-installation 7, fuel benchmark carbon leakage, CBAM

This section covers sub-installations covered by a fuel benchmark, deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage, and producing a CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.5.

G.I.8 Fall-Back Sub-installation 8, process emissions carbon leakage, non-CBAM

This section is for process emissions sub-installations²³ deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM product. The template automatically provides the name of the sub-installation if it is relevant for the installation being reported, based on information provided in Section A.III.2 (“Sub-installations with fall-back approaches”).

- a) Historic activity levels should be provided in tonnes of CO₂ equivalent for each year. The values entered should include eligible emissions from any waste gases as determined in Section D.IV. The template will automatically determine, based on the start of normal operation indicated in Section A.III, whether the sub-installation has been operating for less than one year during the baseline period. If this is the case, the historic activity level will be determined based on the first calendar year after the start of normal operation, in line with the third subparagraph of Article 15(7).

Production details

The operator should specify to which products or services the sub-installation relates. These should, to the extent feasible, be defined by physical units and processes. This type of sub-installation always relates to production of goods not covered by product benchmarks within the installation. More specifically the operator should specify:

- b) **Identification of relevant products or services associated with this sub-installation:**
 - Process emission type: The different types are: “N₂O”, “PFCs”, “CO₂ (waste gas corrected)”, “reduction of metals compounds”, “removal of impurities”, “decomposition of carbonates”, “chemical synthesis”,

²³ It is of utmost importance of not confusing the process emissions as referred to in the MRGs and the process emission sub-installation that is relevant for allocation purposes, e.g., emissions from flue gas cleaning are “process emissions” according to Annex II MRR, but not eligible for free allocation according to Article 2(1) of the FAR. Therefore, emissions from flue gas cleaning are reported in the Sheets B+C, but they shouldn’t be related to a process emissions sub-installation See *Guidance Document 2 on allocation approaches for further clarifications*.

“carbon containing materials”, “reduction of metalloid oxides and non-metal oxides”. *The different types of process emissions are defined in Article 2(10) of the FAR. The NIMs baseline data template facilitates the selection of type by providing a drop-down menu.*

- The name of the product or service type to which the process emissions relate.
 - The relevant PRODCOM 2010 code for the activity related to the process emissions. *A list of PRODCOM 2010 codes can be found at http://ec.europa.eu/eurostat/ramon/nomenclatures/index.cfm?TargetUrl=LST_CLS_DLD&StrNom=PRD_2010&StrLanguageCode=EN&StrLayoutCode=HIERARCHIC. The PRODCOM codes should be entered in the format “nnnnnnnn”, i.e., without any dots or other delimiters between the numbers. If PRODCOM codes are not available for the specific product, 4-digit level NACE codes should be provided, in the format “nnnn”. NACE codes can also be used instead of PRODCOM codes if several similar products within the same NACE sector are covered. The PRODCOM/NACE codes should be used to verify the carbon leakage status of activities within the sub-installation.*
 - The CN codes relating to the product(s) produced. The CN codes to be used are those defined under Regulation (EEC) No 2658/87, which can be found at: <https://eur-lex.europa.eu/1987/2658/2023-06-17>.
- c) Disaggregation of **production levels**: unit and production levels of each of the products or service. This second table automatically copies the product name or service type listed in point (b) above.

G.I.9 Fall-Back Sub-installation 9, process emissions non carbon leakage, non-CBAM

This section is for process emissions sub-installations²³ not deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a non-CBAM product. For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.8.

Operators should be careful and ensure that only activities deemed not to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage are included in this sub-installation.

G.I.10 Fall-Back Sub-installation 10, process emissions carbon leakage, CBAM

This section is for process emissions sub-installations²³ deemed to be exposed to a risk of carbon leakage and producing a CBAM product. For this sub-installation, operators need to provide the same data as for the sub-installation discussed in Section G.I.8.

H “Special BM” – Special data for some product benchmarks

For some product benchmark sub-installations, the historical activity level or allocation needs to be calculated according to a special methodology. This Part of the document gives guidance on the data collection required to apply these special methodologies. The methodologies are specified in Annex III of the FAR. *For more guidance on special methodologies, see Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance. In the NIMs baseline data template, the historical activity levels determined in this section are automatically copied to Sheet F.*

H.I CWT (Refinery products)

This section gives guidance for data collection for refinery sub-installations. This section is only relevant for installations that contain a refinery sub-installation. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically shows in point (a) whether this section is **relevant** based on the data collected according to Section A.III.1 (“Product benchmark sub-installations”). See Chapter 1 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for more information about refinery sub-installations).*

- b) The operator should specify the relevant **throughput in kilotonnes** for each CWT function. The following abbreviations are used in the table: F for net fresh feed, R for reactor feed including recycle, P for product feed, and SG for synthesis gas production for POX units. See Annex II.1 of the FAR for definitions of CWT functions and definitions of throughput for each function. The template will automatically determine, based on the start of normal operation indicated in Section A.III, whether the sub-installation has been operating for less than one year during the baseline period. If this is the case, the historic activity level will be determined based on the first calendar year after the start of normal operation, in line with the third sub-paragraph of Article 15(7). However, this can only be done at a later stage, once these values are known. *See Chapter 1 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for additional guidance to these definitions and to data quality.*
- c) The annual Historic Activity Level in CWT (in tonne) per year should then be calculated from the specified throughputs of the different functions. This should be done according to the part of the formula in point 1 of Annex III to the FAR before determining the arithmetic mean. See Annex II.1 to the FAR for values of CWT factors. The NIMs baseline data template automatically performs the required calculation. *See Chapter 1 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for guidance on the calculation of the annual historical activity levels of a refinery sub-installation.*

In the NIMs baseline data template, the historical activity levels determined in this section are automatically copied to Sheet F.

H.II Lime

This section gives guidance for data collection for lime sub-installations. This section is only relevant for installations that contain a lime sub-installation. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically shows in point (a) whether this section is **relevant** based on the data collected according to Section A.III.1 (“Product benchmark sub-installations”). See Chapter 12 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for more information about lime sub-installations).*

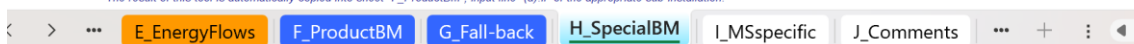

H.IV Steam cracking

This section is only relevant for installations that contain a steam cracking sub-installation. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically shows in point (a) whether this section is **relevant** based on the data collected according to Section A.III.1 (“Product benchmark sub-installations”). - c) **Supplemental feed of hydrogen** in tonnes of hydrogen per year.
Supplemental feed of ethylene in tonnes of ethylene per year.
Supplemental feed of high value chemicals other than hydrogen and ethylene in tonnes of high value chemicals per year.
- d) The **annual historical activity level** in tonnes of net high value chemicals per year should then be calculated. This should be done according to the part of the formula in point 4 of Annex III of the FAR before determining the median. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically performs the required calculation. See also Chapter 42 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance.*

In the NIMs baseline data template, the historical activity levels determined in this section are automatically copied to Sheet F.

The preliminary allocation to steam cracking sub-installations is determined according to Article 19 of the FAR. See also Chapter 42 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance. The preliminary allocation can be determined from the reported data. The NIMs baseline data template calculates the allocation correction. No action is required from the operator.

H.V Aromatics

This section gives guidance for data collection for sub-installations that produce aromatics. This section is only relevant for installations that contain an aromatics sub-installation. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically shows in point (a) whether this section is **relevant** based on the data collected according to Section A.III.1 (“Product benchmark sub-installations”). See Chapter 43 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for more information about sub-installations that produce aromatics)*

- b) The operator should specify the relevant **throughput** in kilotonnes throughput **for each CWT function**. The following abbreviations are used in the table: F for net fresh feed, and P for product feed. See Annex II.2 to the FAR for definitions of CWT functions and definitions of throughput for each function. *See Chapter 43 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for additional guidance to these definitions and to data quality.*
- c) The **annual Historic Activity Level** in CWT (in tonnes) per year from the specified throughputs of the different functions should then be calculated. This should be done according to the part of the formula in point 5 of Annex III of the FAR before determining the median. See Annex II.2 of the FAR for values of CWT factors. *The NIMs baseline data template automatically performs the required calculation. See Chapter 43 of Guidance Document 9 on sector specific guidance for guidance on the calculation of the annual historical activity levels of an aromatics sub-installation.*

Important note: The reporting is done in kilotonnes, but the benchmark is expressed in t CO₂/CWT, where CWT is expressed in tonnes. Therefore the results in this section are multiplied with a factor of 1000, which is not explicitly mentioned in point 5 of Annex III of the FAR.

In the NIMs baseline data template, the historical activity levels determined in this section are automatically copied to Sheet F.

6 Annex A: Comparison with 2019 Guidance Document 3

This chapter presents the main changes in the template as compared to the 2019 version, these are correlated to the main changes in the 2024 version of Guidance Document 3 as compared to the 2019 version

Sheet A

This Sheet has seen the biggest changes in the template, with the addition of a full section on conditionality, split into the following 3 sub-sections:

- A.II.2: Conditionality 1: Outstanding recommendations for energy efficiency improvement measures
- A.II.3: Conditionality 2: >80th Percentile performers
- A.II.4: Conditionality 3: +30% for District Heating

Smaller changes have also been made, in the following sections:

- A.I.4 (a): addition of Total rated thermal input
- A.II: at the beginning of this section, the questions regarding eligibility of an installation that were in the previous version are no longer relevant and have been taken out
- A.III.1: addition of columns to the table, relating to the 10% best performers, and the >80% performers
- A.IV. (a): addition of “Installation for municipal waste incineration” in the column “Type of entity” in the table

Sheet E

The following changes have been made in this Sheet:

- E.I: several changes relating to the addition of energy from exothermic heat and from heat from electricity production, the change from “fuel input” to “energy input”, as well as the addition of a CBAM fuel sub-installation.
- E.II: sub-section on “Measurable heat produced from electricity” moved from point (d) to point (b), and CBAM heat sub-installation added in point (r)

- E.III: line 'iv.' added to point (b), relating to the amounts of waste gases from imports that have been produced outside the system boundaries of a production benchmark, and point (k) added, on the amount of waste gases consumed for the production of measurable heat AND exported to other EU ETS installations
- E.IV: point (f) is now always mandatory, regardless of the answer to point (a)

Sheet F

The following changes, listed here for the first product benchmark in the Sheet, have been made for all product benchmarks (i.e., mirrored in sections F.I.2, F.I.3, F.I.4, etc.):

- Sub-section F.I.1(c) has changed from what was formerly “Exchangeability of fuel and electricity” to “Electricity consumption”
- Sub-section F.I.1(h) has been modified from “Fuel input” in the first line of the table to “Energy input”, which now includes the total energy input from fuels, materials and heat from electricity

In addition, the following changes have been made in the Sheet:

- In sub-section G.I.1(d), line “i.” of the table has been changed from “Total fuel input” to “Total energy input”, and the amount of “Measurable heat produced” in sub-section G.I.1(e) has been split into “Total amount produced (incl. electricity)”, and “Heat produced from electricity”. These changes have been made for all heat benchmark sub-installations (i.e., also in Sections G.I.2, G.I.3 and G.I.4).
- In sub-section G.1.5(d), line “i.” of the table has been changed from “Fuel input entered under (a)” to “Energy input entered under (a)”. This change has been made for all fuel benchmark sub-installations (i.e., also in Sections G.I.6 and G.I.7).

Sheet H

The following changes have been made to the Hydrogen special benchmark section:

- In sub-section H.VI(c), lines “ii. Volume fraction of CO”, “iii. Hydrogen (as 100% pure H₂)” and “iv. Carbon monoxide (as 100% pure CO)” have been added to the table
- Sub-section on “Attributable emissions” has been added in sub-section H.VI(d)
- Sub-section H.VI(e) has been changed to “Result: Activity levels for hydrogen corrected for complete waste gas shift, where relevant”, and the table has been expanded to include “i. HAL H₂, actual”, “ii. HAL H₂, WGS”, “iii. Total H₂ (=i.+ii.)”, and “iv. HAL H₂ (corrected)”
