Climate change is one of the most severe problems facing humanity which certainly needs to be dealt with at a global level. Electricity is part of the solution. By establishing a carbon-neutral electricity supply, while at the same time implementing the electrification of heating, transport and industry, major emission reductions would be achieved. Furthermore it is important to keep costs for mitigation at lowest possible level since economic resources are limited. Swedenergy therefore encourage the EU to take a costeffective approach in the negotiations by for example;

- Requiring a legally binding agreement including all major economies

These organisations should be used as discussion partners in a more active way in the negotiations.
